Cellars or Tiles. It is also a cheap and ef-
fective coating on the underneath side of fel-
ters of a Stated or Tiled Roof, and as a Ceiling
to iron Roofs, counteracting Heat, Frost, and
Condensation of Moisture.

The English Felt is put up in rolls of 25
yards in length, by 32 inches in width, and
containing a surface of 200 square feet.

THREE-PLY FELT
FOR ROOFING.
In rolls, 26 inches wide, by 50 feet in length;
each roll will cover a surface 100 feet square, or
100 square feet.

It is to be laid across the roof, single fash-
ion, with a lap of two inches and secured by
nailing the edges with 3d nails and tin caps.
