WOODHULL AND DOUGLASS.—The "Woman's Suffrage, Human Rights" Party, in convention assembled have nominated Victor C. Woodhull for the Presidency...

LIBERAL REPUBLICAN PLATFORM.—We give below, as a part of the program of the coming presidential struggle, the platform adopted at Cincinnati by the Liberal or Reform Republicans...

First.—That there should be a complete reconstruction of several of the most important functions of the government of the United States...

Second.—That the world has advanced so much in the last century that the theories which the present constitution of the United States and of the several States vitalize are in many instances far behind our present civilization...

Third.—That there should be a national code of civil and commercial law uniform throughout the country...

Fourth.—Local self-government, with impartial suffrage, will guard the rights of all citizens more securely than any centralized power...

Fifth.—That all public enterprises should be managed for the public use, so as to produce an income that will pay the cost of construction, management and maintenance...

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SEVENTH.—That the land belongs to the whole people, and should be made use of by actual settlers only, in limited quantities...

EIGHTH.—That there should be but one system of money and currency, and that the national faith in its value...

NINTH.—That the money thus emanating from the government should circulate freely, and that no payment for it should be permitted...

TENTH.—That the system of taxation should be direct, and be a gradual scale, ascending with the increase of individual fortunes...

ELEVENTH.—That there should be unrestricted exchange of all productions and commodities between nations and individuals, without regard to distance or locality...

THIRTEENTH.—That there should be just laws to regulate labor and establish uniform compensation for the same...

FOURTEENTH.—That there should be a uniform system of all the natural resources of the country by the general government...

FIFTEENTH.—That there should be a general and general system of public improvement, and that all persons who have visible means of support for other employment...

SIXTEENTH.—That there should be a government to guarantee employment to all unemployed persons upon equitable principles of time and compensation...

SEVENTEENTH.—That capital punishment should be abolished...

EIGHTEENTH.—That protection of society against crime should be wholly upon the principle of reforming the criminal...

NINETEENTH.—That there should be the most extended public facilities for immediate interchange between producer and consumer...

Twentieth.—That all the mineral resources and water courses belong to the whole people...

Twenty-first.—That the destiny of our government is to extend its supremacy over the American continent...
