NOTICE TO HOTEL KEEPERS AND ALL OTHERS WHO DEAL IN LIQUORS.

FOR the information of all persons concerned, the following Act of the Legislature, passed March 24th, 1868, is published: CHAPTER 191. AN ACT prohibiting the sale of spirituous or fermented liquors in the several counties of the State on the day of election.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That it shall not be lawful for the keeper of any hotel, tavern, store, drinking establishment, or any other place where liquors are sold, or for any person or persons, directly or indirectly, to sell, barter, give, or dispose of any spirituous or fermented liquors, ale or beer, or intoxicating drinks of any kind, on the days of election hereafter to be held in the several counties of this State.

Sec. 2. And be it enacted, That any person violating the provisions of this Act shall be liable to indictment by the Grand Jury of the county where the offence is committed, and shall, upon conviction before any Judge of any of the Circuit Courts of this State, be fined a sum not less than fifty dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each and every offence—one-half the fine shall be paid to the informer, the other half to the County Commissioners, for the use of public roads.


