

Public Local Law.

CHAPTER 219.

AN ACT to repeal section twenty-two, of an act passed January session, eighteen hundred and seventy, chapter one hundred and twenty-eight, entitled an act to repeal section twenty-two, of article forty-one, of the Code of Public General Laws, entitled "Fish and Fisheries," subtitle "Patuxent," regulating the right of fishing in the Patuxent River and its tributaries, and re-enact the same with sub-section A.

WHEREAS, Sundry persons unknown to the citizens of Prince George's, Charles, St. Mary's and Calvert counties, have heretofore frequented the waters of the Patuxent River, and with immense and improper seines, patent weirs and other traps and devices, have been engaged in the catching and taking of fish in said river, and

WHEREAS, The quantity of fish in said river is fast diminishing, and will in no distant day, without some wise, prudent and effectual means be adopted to prevent the wanton destruction of the same, cease to be a source of supply of food to the residents along the valley of said stream, and

WHEREAS, Strangers and non-residents of this State have been in the habit of fishing in the waters of said Patuxent River, in such manner and by such means as to destroy young and small fish in great numbers, and to effectually prevent the passage of fish up said river to their spawning grounds, and

WHEREAS, In order to prevent any further wanton destruction of fish in the waters of said river, by such seines, patent weirs, traps and other devices aforesaid, and to protect the citizens of Prince George's, Charles, St. Mary's and Calvert counties, in their rights, therefore—

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That section twenty-two, of an act passed at January session, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, chapter one hundred and twenty-eight, entitled an act to repeal section twenty-two, of article forty-one, of the Code of Public General Laws, entitled "Fish and Fisheries," subtitle "Patuxent," regulating the right of fishing in the Patuxent River and its tributaries, and the same is hereby repealed and re-enacted with sub-sections so as to read as follows:

22. It shall not be lawful for any person or persons other than bona fide residents, citizens of Prince George's, Charles, St. Mary's and Calvert counties, to take or catch fish in the waters of the Patuxent River and its tributaries, with any seine, trap or other device, excepting only the hook and line; provided, that the provisions of this section shall not apply to such as shall obtain permission from the owners of lands bordering on said waters, to fish off and opposite his, her or their land or lands so bordering on said waters; and provided that none other than bona fide residents, citizens of said counties, shall use any of the waters of said river that bind on Prince George, Charles and Calvert counties, above the village known as B-neddy, any seine, weir, or net more than seventy fathoms long, and less than two inches square in the mesh.

SECTION 2. Any person or persons violating the provisions of this act, shall be fined not less than twenty-five nor more than one hundred dollars, in the discretion of the justice of the peace before whom the case is heard, which amount shall be appropriated to the public school fund of the county wherein such judgment is rendered; and for the payment of the amount of fine so adjudged any boat, seine, weir or other fishing tackle used by any person or persons in violation of the provisions of this act, shall be seized and held as security upon complaint against such offending party.

SECTION 2. And be it enacted, That this act shall take effect from the date of its passage. Approved, April 3d, 1874.

Hill, only child and heir of Eppy Long, deceased, is entitled to a one-fifth interest in said Real Estate; that Eppy Long is entitled to one-fifth; Mary Brady one-fifth; the heirs at law of George W. Backler, deceased, one-fifth; and the heirs at law of John H. Long, assignee of Robert Backler, one-fifth, and the Bill prays for a sale of said Real Estate and a division of the proceeds among the parties entitled.

And the Bill further states, that Eppy Long, Zachariah Backler and Solomon Backler are non-residents of the State of Maryland. 
