On Tuesday after the first Monday, being the 2d day of November, 1875,

for the purpose of electing one person to be Governor of the State of Maryland; one person to be Comptroller of the Treasury of the State of Maryland, and one person to be Attorney General of the State of Maryland.

Voters will also cast their ballots "For the Constitutional Amendment" or "Against the Constitutional Amendment," in accordance with the following Act of the General Assembly, passed at January Session, 1874, for amending the Constitution of the State:

"An Act to Amend Section 8, of Article 4, of the Constitution of the State of Maryland."
SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, three-fifths of all the members of the two Houses concurring, that the following section be, and the same is hereby proposed, as an amendment to the Constitution of this State, and if adopted by the legal and qualified voters thereof, as provided, it may be the same to supersede and stand in the place of Section 8, of Article 4, of said Constitution.

SECTION 2. The parties in any cause may submit the same to the court for determination without the aid of a jury, and in all suits or actions of law, issued from the Orphans' Court, or from any court, sitting in equity, and all cases of presentment or indictments for offences, which are or may be punishable by death, pending in any of the courts of law, in this State, having jurisdiction thereof, upon suggestion, in writing, under oath, of either of the parties to said proceedings, that such party cannot have a fair and impartial trial in the court in which the same may be pending, the said court shall order and direct the record of proceedings in such suit or action, issue, presentment or indictment, to be transmitted to some other court, having jurisdiction in such case, for trial; but, in all other cases of presentment or indictment, pending in any of the courts of law in this State, having jurisdiction thereof, in addition to the suggestion, in writing, of either of the parties to such presentment or indictment, that such party cannot have a fair and impartial trial in the court in which the same may be pending, it shall be necessary for the party making such suggestion, to make it satisfactorily appear to the court that such suggestion is true, or that there is reasonable ground for the same; and thereupon, the said court shall order and direct the record of proceedings, in such presentment or indictment, to be transmitted to some other court having jurisdiction in such cases for trial, and such right of removal shall exist upon suggestion, in cases when all the judges of said court may be disqualified, to sit in any such case, and said court, to which the record of proceedings in such suit or action, issue, presentment or indictment, had been originally instituted therein, and the General Assembly shall make such modification of existing law as may be necessary to regulate and give force to this provision."

SECTION 3. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That said foregoing section hereby proposed as an amendment to the Constitution, shall be, at the next general election to be held in this State, submitted to the legal and qualified voters thereof, for their adoption or rejection, in pursuance of the directions contained in Article 14 of the constitution of this State, and at the said general election, the vote on said proposed amendment to the Constitution shall be by ballot, and upon each ballot there shall be written or printed these words, "For the Constitutional Amendment," or "Against the Constitutional Amendment," as the voter shall elect, and immediately after said election, due returns shall be made to the Governor of the vote for and against said proposed amendment, as directed by the said 14th Article of the Constitution."

The polls for said Election will be opened in each and every Election District of said county, at the usual places of holding the polls, at nine o'clock, a. m., and will close at six o'clock, p. m., when the ballots shall be opened and publicly counted.

STATE OF MARYLAND, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

Proclamation.
WHEREAS, The Constitution of the State of Maryland, by Article 14, Section 4, directs amendments to the Constitution, to be made as follows:

"The General Assembly may propose amendments to the Constitution, provided that each amendment shall be embraced in a separate bill, embodying the Article or Section, as the same will stand when amended and passed by three-fifths of all the members elected to each of the two Houses, by yeas and nays, to be entered on the Journals, with the proposed amendment. The bill or bills, proposing amendments or amendments, shall be published by order of the Governor, in at least two newspapers, in each county, where so many may be published, and where not more than one may be published, then in that newspaper, and in three newspapers published in the City of Baltimore, one of which shall be in the German language, once a week, for at least three months, preceding the next general election, at which the said proposed amendment shall be submitted, in a form to be prescribed by the General Assembly, to the qualified voters of the State, for adoption or rejection. The votes cast for or against said proposed amendment or amendments, severally, shall be returned to the Governor, in the manner prescribed in other cases, and if it shall appear to the Governor that a majority of the votes cast at said election on said amendments, severally, were cast in favor thereof, the Governor shall, by his proclamation, declare the said amendment or amendments, having received the majority of the votes, to have been adopted by the people of Maryland, as part of the Constitution thereof, and, thereupon, said amendment or amendments shall be in force as if they had been adopted in manner aforesaid; to the voters of this State, at the same election, they shall be so submitted, as that each amendment shall be voted on separately."

AND, WHEREAS, An Act of the General Assembly, at January Session, 1874, Chapter 264, was passed, for amending the Constitution of the State, as follows:

"An Act to amend Section 8, of Article 4, of the Constitution of the State of Maryland."
SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, three-fifths of all the members of the two Houses concurring, that the following section be, and the same is hereby proposed, as an amendment to the Constitution of this State, and if adopted by the legal and qualified voters thereof, as provided, it may be the same to supersede and stand in the place of Section 8, of Article 4, of said Constitution."

Now, therefore, I, JAMES BLACK GROOME, Governor of the State of Maryland, in compliance with the requirements of the provisions of the Constitution, do order and direct the foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution, of the State of Maryland, to be published in two newspapers in each county, where so many may be published, and where not more than one may be published, then in that newspaper, and in three newspapers published in the City of Baltimore, one of which shall be in the German language, once a week, for at least three months, preceding the next general election, to be held in November next, the said newspapers to be by me designated.
