

NOTICE
TO HOTEL KEEPERS AND ALL OTHERS WHO DEAL IN LIQUORS

FOR the information of all persons concerned, the following Act of the Legislature, past March 24th, 1865, is published:

CHAPTER 191.

AN ACT prohibiting the sale of spirituous or fermented liquors in the several counties of the State on the day of election.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That it shall not be lawful for the keeper of any hotel, tavern, store, drinking establishment, or any other place where liquors are sold, or for any person or persons, directly or indirectly, to sell, barter, give or dispose of any spirituous or fermented liquors, ale or beer, or intoxicating drinks of any kind, on the days of election hereafter to be held in the several counties of this State.

Sec 2. And be it enacted, That any person violating the provisions of this Act shall be liable to indictment by the Grand Jury of the county where the offence is committed, and shall, upon conviction before any Judge of any of the Circuit Courts of this State, be fined a sum not less than fifty dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each and every offence—one-half the fine shall be paid to the informer, the other half to the County Commissioners, for the use of the public roads.



STATE OF MARYLAND,
EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

Proclamation

Whereas, The Constitution of the State of Maryland, by Article 14, Section 2, directs amendments to the Constitution, to be made as follows:

"Section 1. The General Assembly may propose amendments to the Constitution, provided that such amendments shall be embraced in a separate bill, embracing the Article or Section, as the case may be, and such bill shall be passed by three-fourths of all the members of each of the two Houses, by yeas and nays; to be entered on the Journal, with the proposed amendment. The bill, if passed, shall be published in the next issue of the State Gazette, and shall be read in the next ensuing general election, at which the proposed amendment shall be submitted, in a form to be prescribed by the General Assembly, to the qualified voters of the State, for adoption or rejection. The votes cast for or against said proposed amendment or amendments, severally, shall be returned to the Governor, in at least two newspapers, in each county, where so many may be published, and where not more than one may be published, then in that newspaper, and in three newspapers published in the City of Baltimore, one of which shall be in the German language, once a week, for at least three months before the next ensuing general election, at which the proposed amendment shall be submitted, in a form to be prescribed by the General Assembly, to the qualified voters of the State, for adoption or rejection. The votes cast for or against said proposed amendment or amendments, severally, shall be returned to the Governor, in at least two newspapers, in each county, where so many may be published, and where not more than one may be published, then in that newspaper, and in three newspapers published in the City of Baltimore, one of which shall be in the German language, once a week, for at least three months before the next ensuing general election, at which the proposed amendment shall be submitted, in a form to be prescribed by the General Assembly, to the qualified voters of the State, for adoption or rejection.
