THE MEETING OF THE 23RD.—The Democratic Central Committee for our county have it in contemplation, we learn, to make a call in our next issue for a grand mass meeting of the Democratic and conservative voters of the county in Leonardtown on Thursday, the 23rd of October, instant, to meet our candidate for Governor and other members of our State Ticket who are engaged to be present on the occasion. Committees of Arrangements and Reception are now in process of formation and will be announced next week.

TILDEN NOT TO BLAME.—Judge Black says the talk to the effect that Tilden ought to have seized the presidency and had himself inaugurated at all risks is "unmitigated nonsense." If the House had declared him elected, then he would have been unfaithful to his duty if he had not taken possession; but when his political supporters in Congress permitted him and his constituents to be juggled out of their rights, he could not remedy the wrong.

Governor Carroll, in his speech in Baltimore, said: "We will need economy and retrenchment in our expenditures, the lopping off of many useless offices, and a new registration law by which perfect fairness can be secured at our elections. The people will also demand an absolute change in the present system of the inspection of tobacco, and such a modification of our school system as will guard more securely the interests of the public."

Mr. Joseph Thompson, who was the Workingman's candidate for Mayor of Baltimore last year, and was supported by the Republican party, made a speech at a Democratic meeting in this city on Wednesday night. He said: "Good laws and worthy officers were what we want now. These being now brought forward by the Democratic party, with such candidates as Wm. T. Hamilton at its front, he had no hesitation in endorsing every man on the Democratic ticket. He believed the labor party could not hold its position as a party against the principles and men now in the front of the Democratic party. As for himself he was always a Democrat in principle."

Mr. Benjamin Haese, of Prince Frederick county, from 30 sheep, kept on his farm, on the Patuxent, this year realized the handsome sum of \$254.50. The lambs, forty-nine in number, sold for an average of \$4, making \$196. The old sheep averaged seven and a half pounds of wool each, which at twenty-six cents per pound, made \$385.50.

The Hon. William T. Hamilton, Democratic nominee for Governor of Maryland, is said to be a man of wealth; and the Hon. Mr. Cery, Republican nominee for the same position, is also represented as a modern Cincinnatus. An old saying hath it, "money makes the mare go," and we may, therefore, look out for a lively contest.

HAMILTON AND REFORM.—The manner of man and sort of reformer that Hamilton is may be inferred from the following extract from a speech delivered by him at Bel Air, Harford county, a few days ago: "Mr. Hamilton next alluded to the subject of taxation, and charged the people to watch their money themselves and make their representatives watch it. When a man says 'I want part of this money,' I hauled this voter to the polls or did this party service," tell him the money was not collected for that purpose. If he is a good, clever fellow, let him take chances for office, but do not pay him a salary out of proportion to what other people get for the same work. Pension no one on the State, except those too poor and unable to work. It is a bribery to idleness. Let me tell you, gentlemen who are seeking for office, I am not going to give all my time listening to clamors for office. That evil must be corrected. I have seen great big men, able to cut three or four cords of wood a day, acting as pages to the Legislature.—When I was in the Legislature thirty years ago, said Mr. Hamilton, with Major Stephenson and Thomas Hope, of your county, I had to go to the post-office for my letters. Now you will have a letter delivered to you. Now I have all kinds of gilt chairs to sit upon, but in those days good strong chairs were used and they were not ornamented. We want a simple, frugal, economical government, and will have it if there is power in the Democratic party. We believe in the true principles of the constitution and must come to them. We must reduce the expenses of government. The amount is appalling. The State of Maryland should be out of debt and it is time to quit going in debt. He regarded office hunting as the great evil of the day. The federal office-holders number 100,000 and the State office-holders nearly one million. Drunkenness is the worst evil in the land and office-seeking is the next. It is destroying labor. Work, toil, sow and spin, he concluded, beauty and ornament your homes, instead of being pensioners upon the people."

The following description of the personal appearance of our candidate we find in a late issue of Bel Air "Egis": "Mr. Hamilton is rather above the medium height, robust, with a ruddy, pleasant face, and the picture of a stout, hearty farmer, with whom the world has gone well, rather than the keen, sagacious lawyer that he also is. His face denotes energy, power, will and honesty of purpose. His style of speaking is bold, clear and logical, his arguments being driven home as with a sledge-hammer."

C. O. Fulton, Esq., editor of the Baltimore American and author of Europe Viewed Through American Spectacles, has taken unto himself an additional rib. At an early hour in the evening of Tuesday last, he was united in marriage with Mrs. Caroline K. Driscoll, of North Poppleton street, Baltimore. The rites were solemnized in Washington, D. C., by the Rev. Dr. Lanahan, of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The strictest privacy was observed, and but few, save the officiating minister and the high and happy contracting parties, were present.

Marlboro' Gazette: In this age of long-range shooting matches and gunning expeditions on the marshes of the Patuxent in pursuit of the toothsome oriole, a word in regard to a recent exploit of Miss Emma Boswell, daughter of Mr. James H. Boswell, of Hill's Landing, may not be out of place. On Saturday last this young lady, in company with her father, went out in a boat on the marsh near the above-named place, the father acting as pusher, and the daughter handling the gun. In a very short time the lady killed 35 birds out of 38 shots.

The colored voters in St. Louis have resolved that they will not vote the republican ticket any longer unless they are given a share of the offices in proportion to their voting strength and committees have been appointed to inform the republican managers of this determination.

St. John's Academy. In the last issue of the Academy Journal, published at Alexandria, Va., we notice among students at St. John's Academy from this county and upon the Roll of Honor for September, Charles F. Morgan and P. Manly Clarke. Walter B. Dent, also of this county, we see from the Journal, is its leading editor and Major commanding the Cadet Corps, composed of students of the Academy. These distinctions speak well for St. Mary's.

In pursuance of the requirements of Section 6, of Article 69, of the Code of Public General Laws, as amended at January Session, 1876, Chapter 208, and which reads as follows: "That the Comptroller shall furnish each officer of the State, whose accounts are in arrears, at least sixty days prior to a general election, a full statement of his accounts, and in default of such statement, the Comptroller to have published weekly, for one month, in one or more newspapers, in the county or city in which said defaulters have held, or may be holding office, and in no other newspapers, the names and titles of said officers, with the amount of said deficiencies and the cost of advertisement of the account of each such defaulter may be recovered in the name of the State, against the official bond of such defaulter. But no defaulter, whose accounts have remained unsettled for over five years, shall be advertised."
