STATE OF MARYLAND. EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

ANNAPOLIS, February 15, 1881.

Whereas the constitution of the State of Maryland, article 3, section 5, requires that the Governor of the time being, after the national census to be taken in the year 1880, to make adjustment of the representation in the House of Delegates of the State as prescribed in section 4 of said article, and to declare the same by proclamation;

And whereas it is made to appear to me by an official record of the census of the people of this State taken in the year aforesaid, under the authority of the United States, that the population of the several counties and the city of Baltimore is as follows, to-wit:

Allegany county, 38,012; Anne Arundel county, 28,526; Baltimore county, 83,234; Baltimore city, 322,190; Carroll county, 10,538; Caroline county, 13,767; Carroll county, 30,992; Cecil county, 27,108; Charles county, 18,548; Dorchester county, 23,110; Frederick county, 56,482; Garrett county, 12,175; Harford county, 28,042; Howard county, 16,141; Kent county, 17,605; Montgomery county, 24,759; Prince George's county, 26,263; Queen Anne's county, 19,257; St. Mary's county, 16,934; Somerset county, 21,668; Talbot county, 19,065; Washington county, 23,561; Wicomico county, 18,016; Worcester county, 19,139.

Now, therefore, I, WILLIAM T. HAMILTON, Governor of the State of Maryland, having in pursuance of the provisions of the constitution made said adjustment of representation, do by this my proclamation, declare that the several counties and the city of Baltimore are of right and shall be entitled to representation in the House of Delegates of this State as follows, to-wit:

Allegany county, four Delegates; Anne Arundel county, four Delegates; Baltimore county, six Delegates; first legislative district of Baltimore city, six Delegates; second legislative district of Baltimore city, six Delegates; third legislative district of Baltimore city, six Delegates; Calvert county, two Delegates; Caroline county, two Delegates; Carroll county, four Delegates; Cecil county, three Delegates; Dorchester county, three Delegates; Frederick county, five Delegates; Garrett county, two Delegates; Harford county, four Delegates; Howard county, two Delegates; Kent county, two Delegates; Montgomery county, three Delegates; Prince George's county, three Delegates; Queen Anne's county, three Delegates; St. Mary's county, two Delegates; Somerset county, three Delegates; Talbot county, three Delegates; Washington county, four Delegates; Wicomico county, three Delegates; Worcester county, three Delegates.

Given under my hand and the great seal of the State of Maryland, at Annapolis, on this 15th day of February, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.
