Personal. The Seventh Comet of the Year. Director Swift of the Warner Astronomical Observatory, Rochester, N. Y., at 11 o'clock P. M. of the 16th ult., discovered a fine, round, tailless comet in the constellation Cassiopeia, which has a light declination of 1 hour 50 minutes and a declination north of 71 degrees with a motion slowly westward. This is the seventh comet which has been discovered since the first of May last, four of which meeting the conditions of the fund, have received the Warner Prize of \$200. Prof. Swift pronouncing the first and best expected in the quarter in which it now appeared. Prof. Swift is not sure at present that the stranger may not be the familiar comet which was discovered by Pons.
