Local Dettings.

In Jail.
On Monday, Sheriff Greenwell lodged
in our county jail, Jos. Medley Jackson,
colored, charged with having, about two
years ago, broken into Parson's Mill. The
prisoner was arrested in Baltimore by Po-
lice Officer John C. Mills.

Our Military.
New and handsome guns have been for-
warded to the Leonardtown Rifles and
commissions have been issued to First
Lieutenant Wm. Hayden and Second Lieu-
tenant G. Morgan Layley. Captain Chesley
believes in work and will soon have the
company finely drilled.

Boat.
Wednesday, the 5th instant, a boat be-
longing to J. T. Swann, of Piney Point,
loaded with 100 green cedar posts, sunk off
Blay Creek in the Potomac River. The
wind was blowing from south west and on
the lee shore the sea was very heavy.
Messrs. Willie Ingram and Geo. Dyer, who
were aboard at the time, reached the shore
safely and with assistance succeeded in
raising the boat.

An Editor Married.
On Wednesday, the 5th instant, Francis
M. Cox, Editor of the Port Tobacco Times,
was married to Miss Cora Dement, daugh-
ter of Captain Wm. F. Dement. The cere-
mony was performed in the Catholic
church at Pocomoke, by the Rev. Father
McDonnell, S. J. The groom stands at the
very head of his profession in this State,
and the bride is one of the leaders in the
social circle of her section and one of the
most charming of our sister country's at-
tractive daughters. We assure our editor-
ial brother that for a bright future and a bliss-
ful married life none are more sincere and
heartfelt than ours.

Our Magistrate's Court.
Since the induction into office of the new
Board of Town Commissioners several cases
for breaches of the peace have been brought
before Squire Camalier. A disturbance last
Saturday night resulted in the arrest of
Chas. Scriber, James Gordon, Phil Butler,
all colored, and Lewis Deveaux, a deputi-
ed assistant of the town bailiff. The trial
was held in the court house last Monday
and a fine was imposed on Scriber, of \$8;
on Gordon, charged with fighting and re-
sisting an officer, \$4.50; on Deveaux and
Butler, for less serious offenses, \$2.10 each.
For complicity in same disturbance, Ma-
gistrate Chase, colored, was fined, \$3.10. Some
of the parties have appealed to the Circuit
Court.

Carried Weapons.
We comment to the attention of persons
in the habit of carrying a pistol or knife,
the following extract from a law passed by
the late Legislature which provides, "that
every person, not being a conservator or a
peace officer to carry such weapons as a
part of his official equipment, who shall
wear or carry any pistol, dirk-knife, Bowie
knife, slung-shot, billy, sand-club, metal
knuckles, razor, or any other dangerous
or deadly weapon of any kind whatever
(pen knives excepted), concealed upon or
about his person, who shall carry or wear
any such weapon openly with the intent
of purpose of injuring any person, shall,
upon conviction thereof, be fined not more
than \$500, or be imprisoned not more than
six months in jail or the House of Correction."

Celebration.
On April the 30th, the Webster Literary
Society of the Western Maryland College
celebrated its fifteenth anniversary at Odd
Fellow's Hall, Westminster. A drama,
entitled "The Mystery of the Flowing
Bowl, or, Twenty Years After," was a
part of the program and among the
persons who found the name of Paul
Cassels, of this village. Orphan the West-
minister Advocate says:
"The part of Clifton Jerome was adminis-
trated by Mr. Paul Coombs, of St. Mary's
county. His manner was easy,
graceful and natural and he spoke in a
clear, distinct tone. In his efforts to un-
tangle the mystery and to discover the mis-
sing millionaire, to restore Marion to her
father, and finally as a successful suitor to
her hand, he carried the sympathy and at-
tention of his audience, and was frequently
applauded."

Civil Service.
The Baltimore American, of the 8th in-
stant, says that a candidate for a place in
the Custom House filled in the blanks in a
civil service examination as follows:
"1. Are you a citizen of the United States?
"I am a Democrat."
"2. I seek the position of inspector of
smoke and whiskey in office, turn out the voters
"3. My P. O. address is No 72 Shirt end
road, Union Territory."
"I was born at the head of Fenwick's
mill dam, in St. Mary's county and have
been a democrat ever since."
His present occupation, the applicant
states, is pressing bricks and then goes on
to give an account of his services to the
cause of Democracy, and implores demo-
crats to come to his rescue. He is willing
to submit to a radical examination by his
own side, but would prefer the other sex.
He thinks he could give points on how to
place dem-crats in office, turn out the voters
who would turn us out and ask no ques-
tions.
The paper ends with the statement that
the applicant "is endorsed by Dr. Tanner
and can fast for forty days."

Orphan's Court.

Court met on Tuesday last, a full bench
present. R. H. Garner was appointed ad-
ministrator of Dr. H. G. Garner. Robert
Alvey and Chas. Burch were appointed
appraisers. Ordered, that the amount of
\$18.90, remaining in the hands of Wm. H.
Moore & Co., be transferred to Catherine
P. Adams, which now stands to the credit
of Wm. Holly, deceased. Mrs. Charles
Owens appeared and declined to adminis-
ter upon the estate of Charles Owens.
The case of W. H. Moore & Co. vs Horatio
Carter, admr. of T. G. Carter called. J.
H. Alvey sworn, Webster Lyon sworn and
T. C. Lyon sworn. Petition dismissed.
Estate to pay costs. Joseph E. Johnson,
guardian for James H. Mattingley and
others. Guardianship revoked. W. J.
Dawkins appointed. Citation issued for
Caroline Somerville to show why she
will not administer on the Somerville es-
tate. Adjournd to Tuesday, the 25th of
May, instant.

Not Yet Decided.

In our last issue we referred to the fact
that our State's Attorney, Mr. Dan'l C.
Hammett, had gone to Calvert to argue an
important oyster case. He has since re-
turned and reports, we learn, that the case
was not tried, the traverser's counsel, Mr.
Jos. A. Wilson, agreeing with our repre-
sentative and State's Attorney Briscoe, of
Calvert, that Calvert county Court had not
jurisdiction, the offence having been com-
mitted in St. Mary's county—that is, on
this side of the middle of the Patuxent riv-
er—the dividing channel between Calvert
and St. Mary's. It is, however, understood
that a precisely similar case, on appeal from
Justice Z. T. Spalding's decision, will be
heard at the September term of our Circuit
Court.

The case is an interesting one to the two
counties, as it involves the true construc-
tion and constitutionality of the Section of
the Oyster Law of 1886, which restricts the
residents of Calvert and St. Mary's to the
middle of the dividing channel aforesaid.

Flashes.

The town Fathers are taking a census of
the village.
Miss Noma Bohanan, of the 8th district,
is on a brief visit to our town.

In this issue we begin the publication of
the local Laws, applicable to this county,
passed at the recent session of the Legisla-
ture.
Capt. A. A. Lawrence, late deputy Naval
Office of Port of Baltimore, was in town
last Tuesday and paid our office a brief
visit.

A lady friend informs us that tomatoes
in bloom are no rarity in Leonardtown and
they are not importations from St. George's
Island either.
Not having algebraic signs in our fonts
of type we are compelled to omit the solutions
of the problem so kindly sent us by two
esteemed correspondents.

There was quite a gathering of local
political celebrities in town last Tuesday.
The attraction was meetings of the Com-
missioners and Orphan's Courts.
Friday last, an old hollow oak overhang-
ing the public road near Town Run in this
village was set on fire by boys and soon
fell. The tree was an old landmark and
Hon. B. G. Harris states that seventy-five
years ago, when he first remembers it, was
very nearly as large as it was when de-
stroyed.

Commissioner's Court.

The Board of County Commissioners met
in extra session on Monday last, present,
Parsons, Tyler, Dent and Buckler. The
following proceedings were had: Ordered,
that Clerk publish notice in some news-
paper for applications to fill free scholar-
ship application to be filed on or before 2nd
Tuesday in June. Ordered, that Public
Local Laws be published in BEACON and
Enterprise. Ordered, that notice be pub-
lished for sealed proposals to be filed on or
before 2nd Monday in June, for feeding and
keeping paupers at Alms House, and said
bid not to include clothing and medicines.
Ordered, that after the close of the present
Levy all accounts and Road Reports be
examined and verified by affidavit. The
Board imposed State Tax of 184 cents on
the \$100. The Bonds of Perry Hayden,
Collector 4th district, were presented and
approved. The following Collectors were
re-appointed, having failed to qualify:
1st dist.—W. A. Langley; 2nd—M. L.
Hammett; 3rd—Dr. Wm. H. Stone; 5th—
E. Luther Burroughs; 7th—J. H. Bailey;
8th—M. L. Hammett. The following were
appointed in places of others declined:
6th dist.—James S. Posey; 9th—J. L. Mil-
burn.
The following Constables were appoint-
ed:
1st dist.—Sam. L. Rabeigh; 2nd—J. L.
Milburn; 4th—W. A. Lyon and J. J.
Alvey. The Board then adjourned to May
11.

May 11, 1886. The Board met, all the
members present. J. Thos. Abell was ap-
pointed Collector and Constable, vice, W.
H. Stone, declined. Edward S. Abell was
appointed Constable in the 1st district.
On application of John A. Camalier and
Joseph H. Key, of Board of Commissioners
of the village of Leonardtown, the Court
made an appropriation of \$100 for use of
said Town Commissioners to be expended
under exclusive control of said Town Com-
missioners. The Clerk was ordered to take
steps to repair Alms House Pump.
The Board completed Pension List for
1886 and adjourned to May 12, 1886.

St. Inigo's Items.

mers at present. Yes, corn-planting is "the
order of the day" with them. A larger
area, we understand, will be planted than
was planted the past season. The fly is
doing some mischief to tobacco beds. We
trust this peculiarly constructed insect will
soon disappear.
Soft crabs are being shipped in small lots
to Washington. Herrings and alewives
are plentiful and cheap. There is a fair
prospect for fruit, particularly apples and
pears.
Merchants are complaining of "tight
times."
W. W. Grey has rented the store-house
at Scotland P. O., and Pembroke P. Smith
has been engaged as clerk. Mr. Grey will
soon open with a large and well selected
and assorted stock of goods. He is an
"A-1" merchant.
The cry of "Sparrow-grass" is heard in
the land. It is a wholesome article of diet.
The gardens of the neighborhood are
very forward. J. Forrest Freeman has
pease and potatoes nearly large enough for
the table. He has been eating onions and
radishes for sometime. Mr. Austin
Adams expects to ship tomatoes by the 1st
of June, if not earlier. Thousands of sweet
potato plants have been set out.
Wheat continues to grow rapidly. Its
emergence here indicates its healthy condi-
tion.
The Baltimore Oriole (*Icterus Baltimore*)
is visiting this section. Its movements are
graceful and its song is sweet.
Phoebe Gray, colored, who was badly
burned some days ago, died on the 7th, and
Mrs. John Bradman, an estimable lady,
died 9th. Death is a terrible thing to com-
plate.
Rev. Father Walker preached a telling
sermon at St. Inigo's on Sunday. He is
greatly beliked, and we trust that he will
remain here for an indefinite time.

Resolutions.

Whereas, it is eminently proper that the
Public School Teachers of St. Mary's
County, in meeting assembled, should ex-
press our approval or disapproval of an
measure affecting the public educational
interest of the state and county:
Resolved I, That we regard the passage
of the Local School Bill by the recent Leg-
islature of the State as improper, and as a
measure, if not an entering wedge, to the
destruction of the Public School system of
the State, one that will greatly impair the
usefulness and influence of our schools, and
therefore, to be deplored as well as con-
demned.
Resolved II, That Hon. R. Johnson Col-
ton, State Senator from St. Mary's, is en-
titled to our confidence and esteem for the
proper exercise of his potent influence in
having St. Mary's county stricken from the
Local School Bill, and that our thanks are
due and hereby tendered him.
Resolved III, That the language used by
Senator Colton in having St. Mary's stricken
from Local School Bill, and the reasons
assigned, viz: "It would not give the relief
intended; if a change was desirable it
should be uniform and not apply to three
counties; that the committee on educa-
tional and political matters," had placed him
on record as a statesman, and set an example
worthy of imitation.
Resolved IV, That a copy of these resolu-
tions be presented to the county of St. Mary's
papers for publication, and that an engrossed
copy be prepared and presented by the
Secretary to the Hon. R. Johnson Colton.
