Congress is expected to adjourn by August 1st, proximo.

W. T. Sampson has been appointed Superintendent of the Annapolis Naval Academy in place of Capt. Ramsay.

A new Extradition Treaty between the United States and Great Britain has been drafted. It extends the operation of the treaty of 1842 to extradition for various offenses not covered by that instrument.

The name of ex-Gov. Wm. Pinkney Whyte is prominently mentioned in connection with the Solicitor-Generalship vacated by the rejection by the U. S. Senate of Hon. John Goode, of Virginia.

The Morning Herald reports the disappearance from Baltimore of Capt. James R. Willing, a city representative in the last Legislature. The Captain has left many creditors to mourn his untimely departure.

Again there is talk of a European war. Russia is mobilizing and drilling her vast armies and preparing for the coming storm by building fortifications and gathering war materials. In Western Europe, the activity noticeable in the French War Department is said to be creating an uneasy feeling in the minds of the rulers of the adjoining nations.

A little girl was arrested and taken to the Tombs on a charge of selling flowers on Sunday. The police force of New York is "one of the finest," and crime dare not lurk in the city under the eagle eye of the dandy cops. Oh, of course, there is an occasional murder, and prize fighters knock down and drag out, and adulterers are bribed and defaulters escape to Canada, and banks burst and ruin depositors, and all that, but they are only minor affairs. Justice is the same cussed fraud in New York that it is elsewhere says George W. Peck.

Sunday's Baltimore news speaking of the coming Congressional contest in this district says, "In the Fifth district, where the Knights of Labor are developing great strength and activity in the matter of electing a successor to the Hon. Barnes Compton, the Republicans are divided in opinion as to the propriety of putting a candidate in the field. As the labor people and Republicans are united on the subject of protective tariff legislation, it is maintained by the managers that to have two candidates against Mr. Compton, whose renomination is conceded, would simply be a division of strength. Hence they think it will be the part of wisdom to unite on one man acceptable to both. It is said that there is a very bitter feeling against Mr. Compton among the labor people on account of his various votes in Congress. The names of General Beale and Talbot J. Albert are mentioned in connection with the Republican nomination which it is deemed advisable to nominate."

It is now too soon to hazard predictions, but Mr. Compton's votes in Congress to reduce the Tariff and his Civil Service speech have certainly strengthened him in this section.

WASHINGTON, July 19, 1886.

Canada is in danger of losing its prestige as an asylum for bank presidents, clerks and secretaries, wanted in this country for their misdeeds. The draft of an extradition treaty between Great Britain and the United States has been forwarded to the State Department by Minister Phelps, and is now before the Senate. It is stated that the treaty provides for the extradition of dynamites, and includes also the surrender of persons wanted for embezzlement, fraud, breach of trust and other crimes. As to just what crimes may be included, when the treaty is eventually signed, is of course uncertain, but it will doubtless be a very effective document, and a decided improvement over the present treaty.

Mr. Morrison's joint resolution directing payment of the surplus in the Treasury, on the public debt, which passed the House on Wednesday last, provides that whenever the surplus in the Treasury shall exceed \$100,000,000, it shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Treasury to apply such excess towards the payment of interest upon the public debt. The bill has gone to the Senate, and there are many conjectures as to its chances of passing that body. The prevailing opinion seems to be that it will not pass the Senate, and even its most ardent advocates do not venture to predict that it would receive the approval of the

President. As a very large percentage of the U. S. bonds are held by National Banks as security for their circulation, and a withdrawal of these bonds would necessarily involve the retirement of the currency issued upon them, and result in a contraction of the currency to that extent.

The Mexican Pension Bill which passed the House on the 5th of April, was passed by the Senate on Wednesday, and now awaits the signature of the President. The bill provides a pension of eight dollars per month to all surviving officers, soldiers and sailors who served a term of at least sixty days in the war with Mexico.

The twelfth annual convention of the representatives of southern railroads was held here during the week. Among the eighty delegates present were included the presidents and general executive officers of every railroad system from the Potomac to the Gulf, and from the Atlantic coast to the Mississippi River.

General B. F. Butler has been spending a considerable portion of his time of late in calling upon the various members of the committee on public buildings and grounds, with the view of selling his mansion on Capitol Hill to the government. His price is \$275,000. Some of the members of the committee have declared themselves in favor of purchasing the building for the use of the various scientific bureaus, which at present occupy rented buildings.

The Mexican government is about to commence the erection of a handsome legation building in this city. The plans were prepared by an architect here and have been sent to Mexico for approval.

DEATH OF "NED BUNTLINE."—Mr. Edward Z. C. Judson, the well-known author of dime novels and stories of adventures for boys, died on Friday at his home in Stamford, N. Y. He was 64 years of age and his death was caused by heart disease. His history is remarkable. He ran away from home to go to sea when he was a boy, and his first story, "The Captain's Fig," was published in the Knickerbocker Magazine in 1838. He became the editor of a weekly paper called Ned Buntline's Own, and during the Maccady riots he was arrested for inciting and fomenting the outbreak against the tragedian, and he was sentenced in September, 1849, to a year's imprisonment on Blackwell's Island and a fine of \$250. After his release he continued to write stories for weekly newspapers and dime novels, and all of a wildly sensational type. He fought in the war and afterwards he wrote a "border drama" for Buffalo Bill. He leaves quite a large amount of property, consisting of life insurance stocks, rare pictures, horses and carriages and real estate. His family consisted of a wife and one child. Mr. Buntline owned a country place near Warrenton, Va., and generally spent his winters there.
