CALIFORNIA, 1886.
Messrs. Editors—Acknowledging the dim distance of the invisible Thomas Jefferson, whose shadow has long since passed away, but whose name is still bright and connected with our independence, I at last have found time and beg leave to present myself to your readers in reply to a fictitious Justice, who appeared in the *Enterprise* some four weeks since, claiming to be forced to said publication by my so-called strikes around this place, which I only considered a pastime for the few who might take time to read it, not believing at the time such a net of injustice could be hung around the pathway of such an eminent body of trustees as the gentlemen acting in that capacity; but as officers true to the trust to which they have been so wisely chosen, did duly consider a petition which was so auspiciously lodged in their possession by the hand of Justice, or her next best friend, asking the non-appearance of Mrs. Mittie Goodwin on the ground of total incompetency, and purporting to be signed by Mr. Frank Joy, an ex-trustee, and others, who positively deny even authorizing anyone to sign their names to such a paper, while most of the others were well known to be patrons of other schools, and the two or three patrons who did sign said paper were considered unworthy judges of such a matter in question compared to the school board, and Prof. Newell, under whom this lady received her technical training, which no one save those who have been subjected to it can fully appreciate. I am sure she stood as a beacon light with the ex-Examiner, as also she did with the teachers of this county in their association, as she was chosen recording secretary at their organization. And now we will look back at some of the events of the 7 years Justice refers to and what do we find? Do we not find a daughter of the chairman of the board of trustees with this lady's training casting credit upon her parent for the high cipher taken at the last examination? Justice speaks boldly of the exaggeration of my communication in reference to the petition in favor of the old teacher being signed by 14 patrons of said school. I do claim that it was, and I further claim that patrons are only those who patronize the schools. Justice also speaks of dissatisfaction still existing with a majority of the patrons. I am still unable to say who they call patrons, at least, the school is in full force with a fair attendance, considering the busy season. They briefly state that the chairman of the said board of trustees proposed to the dissatisfied patrons to get said petition, and if signed by a majority of patrons of this school, they should have the preference, fully according with the trustee in his honest convictions, and feeling confident that if the aggrieved would be patron had been successful in obtaining what was recommended, these gentlemen, the trustees, would have with pleasure awarded, as they did, to the true patrons. Justice further speaks of the truthful statement they have given, but since so many have avowed they did not sign any such paper, how do we know that any did? At least, we think that only 3 patrons and a referee were the supporters of this foul play. Not wishing to lay before you the sad events the 7 years referred to by Justice has brought forth, but feel sure they are sufficiently understood, at least, by those who are in sympathy with such a model lady. Lastly, in reference to the school of Mr. Redmond, I am sure I simply referred—not tendering my services as a settlement of any difficulty—therefore cannot see wherein I could have exaggerated in favor of either teacher, trustee or patron. Owing to the time since the heavy head of T. J. tottered to its resting place accounts for the long delay, but I am again with you.
