"Senator Gorman didn't stay over in San Francisco and Omaha for nothing," says the Baltimore Herald, "for it turns out that California has gone Democratic and Nebraska has elected a Democratic Congressman."

A resolution, signed by the Chicago packers, declaring that they will not employ any man who is a member of a labor organization has thrown many thousands of men out of work and caused the Governor of Illinois to order out the State Militia.

Though the Democratic majority in the House has been considerably reduced by the late election, it is still there, while in the Senate which has heretofore been safely Republican a tie is threatened. In view of these facts the leading republican daily in our State suggests that "it would be well for members of its party to sing low for awhile."

This is the only instance in which a Democratic administration has, since Van Buren's time, obtained a majority of the House in its second Congress. Polk lost the House in 1846, Pierce lost it in 1854, Buchanan lost it in 1858. The opposition has not fared much better. Tyler lost it in 1842, Fillmore lost it in 1850, Grant lost it in 1874, Hayes lost it in 1878 and Arthur lost it in 1882.

Lincoln carried the House in his second year, but the South was not represented in that Congress, and in the election of 1862 Lincoln suffered far more severely than the present administration has at the late election. Grant held the House in 1870, but lost it by a decided majority in 1874.

Cleveland is the only Democratic President since Van Buren who has held a majority of the House in the Congress which was chosen during his second year.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8, 1886.

Messrs. Editors—Notwithstanding the fact that the election held upon Tuesday last was the first Congressional election under the present administration, there probably never was an election day in which less interest was manifested by the department clerks in the result. Comparatively few of the clerks went to their homes to vote, and no one would have guessed from going through the departments that an election was in progress. No money was collected, and very few reduced rate tickets for voters going home, were issued by the Campaign Committees.

As the time for Congress to convene approaches, the President finds, that in order to enable him to properly attend to his public duties, that he should be free from interruption, and he has accordingly issued an order to the effect that during the time that intervenes between the 10th of November, and the time of the meeting of Congress, he will deny himself to visitors except upon public business of importance. This will not however be construed to include applications or recommendations for office. He states as his reason for giving the notification in advance of the plea that a trip to Washington has been made in ignorance of the arrangement. The usual public receptions at 1:30 o'clock on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays will be continued as heretofore.

A good story comes from the Comptroller's Office, and I will relate it as an evidence of the alertness evinced by that official in the detection of frauds in his office. It seems that in examining the pay rolls recently it was discovered that upon some of the rolls one of the laborers had signed his name, while on others he made his mark. Suspecting that this discrepancy must conceal a great fraud, all of the accounts were suspended, and the man was notified of the discovery. He at once wrote a letter to the comptroller, in which he called attention to the fact that the vouchers were uniformly signed with a cross-up to a certain date, but thereafter with his own signature, and in explanation of the mystery explained that he had been attending a night school and had learned to write.

Deceased was a fine type of the old-time "Lower Counties" Maryland gentleman of Colonial descent. In the days before the war he and his most estimable wife, a daughter of Gen. Wallace, U. S. A., dispensed an unbounded hospitality in their grand plantation home, graced by fair, accomplished daughters and brave sons. Two of the young men shared the Confederate fortunes. Worcester College boys of some 25 years ago will well remember Louis de Bart and Wallace Gardner.

Mr. Gardner accepted his fatal illness, which lasted one nine weeks, with the Christian resignation of one who was ever a practical Catholic; receiving those last consolations of the faith that upheld him in his final hours. Of those the war brought him his full share. While his sons were in the Confederate service he was arrested at the tinkle of Seward's bell and confined in an "old" military prison, Washington. His plantation was raided by troops; the loss of his slaves impaired his fortune. And now the last chapter has closed on an honorable Catholic life, and a gallant gentleman has been gathered to his fathers. His family will please accept the heartfelt condolence of the writer, who can never forget the delightful hours spent under that hospitable Cavalier roof, in those so happy golden days.
