(Correspondence of the Beacon.)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 21, 1887.

Messrs. Editors.—The widely circulated rumor to the effect that Mr. Manning's resignation was brought about by a rupture between the Secretary and the President has been effectually dispensed of by the publication of the correspondence between them upon the subject. The truth is doubtless as Mr. Manning states in his letter. He found that the close attention necessary in the discharge of his official duties was a task beyond his strength. His friends, who had observed that his health was being affected by his close application, have continued to urge that he should resign, and it is known that he has had the matter in contemplation for some time past.

The air is filled with conjectures in relation to the new Secretary of the Treasury, and a very large number of names have been suggested as persons likely to receive the appointment. It has been intimated that the President seriously contemplates offering the portfolio to his old law partner, Wilson S. Bissell, who is said to possess qualities which eminently fit him for the position.

The President has been somewhat surprised at the number of candidates that have appeared for the five positions as Commissioners in the Interstate Commerce Commission. He is determined to satisfy himself about the capacity of the men before making the appointments.

Notwithstanding the fact that but a limited time remains to the present Congress, and several of the appropriation bills are as yet unacted upon, there is no real foundation for the report that an extra session of Congress is likely to be called. The best informed members of Congress believe that no session will be called, as nothing but a failure to pass the regular appropriation bills before the 4th of March would necessitate it. The unsettled question of a Treasury surplus, important as it is, would not, in itself, occasion the calling of an extra session, as the surplus will be largely absorbed before the opening of the session in December in redeeming the remainder of the three per cent. bonds, and in putting about \$45,000,000 into the Sinking Fund to be used in redeeming the four per cent. bonds.

The historic city of Alexandria, which it will be remembered was, in *ante bellum* days, celebrated as the principal ship-building point in the South, bids fair to regain her former prominence. The old ship yards, which have been for so many years idle, will soon be transformed into a scene of activity such as was probably never equaled, even in the palmy days of the past. The yards have been purchased by the Arrow Steamship Company of New York City, which will put a force of 3,000 men at work upon the first day of April. The company will at that time commence the construction of the largest trans-Atlantic iron steamship that was ever built upon this side of the Atlantic. The vessel will be 540 feet in length, with a tonnage of 5,200. In the construction of the vessel every effort will be made to obtain the greatest possible speed. The vessel, when completed, will constitute one of a fleet of fifteen ocean racers which will be built by the company.

The Democracy of the District has sustained a serious loss in the death of a time honored leader in the person of John E. Norris, Esq. This patriot had, for more than a quarter of a century up to the time of his death, been annually elected to the presidency of the Jackson Democratic Association—an organization at the National Capital known and respected by public men of all shades of politics. Mr. Norris was a man who, by his sterling worth, genial manners and sincerity of heart, endeared himself to a large circle of friends, including within it men prominent in both branches of Congress and elsewhere in official life. His depth of conviction, unflinching courage, disregard for his own personal interests, and earnestness in the cause, made him pre-eminently the recognized leader of the District Democracy. He was a forcible and impressive speaker, logical reasoner, able lawyer, and ripe scholar. On the day of his funeral the courts adjourned, and the judges, accompanied by the entire

bar, of which for more than forty years he had been a member, attended the funeral in a body. The various Democratic associations also attended in a body, and the funeral cortege for that of a private citizen was the largest that the city has witnessed for years. This brief sketch of this widely known and respected man is given for the eyes of such of your readers as may have served your constituency in Congress or otherwise been in public service at the Nation's Capital, and made the friendship of the deceased.
