CALIFORNIA, Md., Sept. 6, 1887.

In perusing the Enterprise of the last issue I noticed a letter from the pen of a "visitor" which, I presume, is an attempt to picture to the public this "thriving little borough of California," as the Baltimore Herald puts it, which is rather too ridiculous to pass by unheeded. Visitor states he has no curiosity to find out who this place derived its name, and that his only noticeable changes here since his visit of three years ago are the conversion of a school house into a dwelling, change of postmasters and the closing of Mr. Cecil's store. I think, unless Visitor's brain and eyes are very much obscured in some way, much more attraction from the changes and improvements at this place are too noticeable and conspicuous to pass unobserved by any one save a blind person. Although of not as grand and perhaps imposing a nature as the spacious residence and beautiful surroundings of Patuxent Beach, we claim that there have been decidedly more changes and improvements here than any other place in the county, Messrs. Editors, not even excepting your pretty little city. In the last three years Mr. Wise has built quite an ornamental addition to his house, also a new stable, plank fence, &c. Besides the remodeling of Mr. Cecil's former dwelling, he has erected a new house, which is beautified by an ornamental gable end front and bay windows on each side, a commodious combination of hay-barn and stable, engine house, addition of lightning rods to all the new buildings, new public school, postoffice, and last but not least, an almost indispensable ice-house. The above comprise the changes and improvements, and all of them have taken place in the last three years.
