MECHANICVILLE, Oct. 25, 1887. Messrs. Editors:—I have been called upon by my friends to answer a charge made against Mr. John F. Ching of having sold the democratic ticket made up of Roman Catholics and rebels.

On Thursday, October 13th, 1887, there was a republican meeting at Mr. R. T. Turner's store, just below this place. About 9:30 o'clock, just as I was about to close my bar, a yelling was heard for Ching, and in a few minutes three white men and four or five colored men entered. Mr. Ching being among the crowd. He (Mr. Ching) asked if I had any republican whiskey. I replied that I had any man's whiskey who bought and paid for it.

He (Mr. Ching) then asked me to criticize the democratic ticket and the party generally, and after talking and arguing for a short time, he wanted to know of a colored man (Robert Cook) if he knew what the democratic ticket meant? Cook answered, no. Then I will explain to you, remarked Ching. "It means democratic, old rebels and Roman Catholics. That is what it means and who can vote it?" These were Mr. John F. Ching's (republican candidate for sheriff) words, uttered in my bar on the 13th of October, 1887, in the presence of several which I can bring forward as witnesses.

Editors:—There is a charge in circulation against our present Board of Circuit Commissioners in appointing Charles Conant to fill the place of Road Surveyor, especially in this district. His reply was, that it had to be fixed by someone and suggested Mr. Carrioco, believing he would take as much or more interest in the said road than anybody else, as it leads to his mill. I told him he could not pick a better man, and Mr. H. told Mr. Carrioco to go ahead and mend the road, which he did to the satisfaction of all. I will say he put it in better condition than it has ever been since the road has been on the county. Now, sirs, admitting that Mr. Carrioco lives in Charles county, he owns property in this county and pays a good tax here, more I will venture to say than those who are grumbling about this mending a little piece of road. I understand this charge is brought as a little political bait for the candidates on the republican ticket, and if this be so and it is the only charge that is made, and it is guaranteed to do all that is claimed.
