NOTICE. To Hotel Keepers and all Others Dealing in Liquors.

AN ACT prohibiting the sale of spirituous or fermented liquors in the several counties of the State on the day of election.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, That it shall not be lawful for the keeper of any hotel, tavern, store, drinking establishment, or any other place where liquors are sold, or for any person or persons, to sell or directly, to sell, barter, or give or dispose of any spirituous or fermented liquors, ale or beer, or intoxicating drinks of any kind, on the days of election, to be held in the several counties of this State.

Sec. 2. Be it enacted, That any person violating the provisions of this Act shall be liable to indictment by the Grand Jury of the county where the offense is committed, and shall, upon conviction before any Judge of any of the Circuit Courts of this State, be fined not more than fifty dollars, to be paid to the State for the use of the School fund.
