Mr. Compton's Views.
A special dispatch to the Baltimore Sun says:
Representative Barnes Compton was at the Postoffice Department yesterday to recommend the appointment of H. H. Beard and Conrad Posey as postmasters at Hancockville, Howard county, and at Iscoe, Charles county, respectively. In speaking with a representative of the Sun about the political contest in the fifth district, Mr. Compton says he can only account for the close vote because of the importation of colored voters into his district by the republicans, and also because of the opposition of democrats who were sore and disappointed by the civil-service policy of the administration. In spite of these facts Mr. Compton says he pulled the largest democratic vote ever given in that district before. In answer to a question as to what grounds Mr. Mull had on which to base his contest, should he determine to make one, Mr. Compton replied:
"None in the world. He may charge that there was intimidation in Anne Arundel county, but it will be a difficult fact for him to establish." Mr. Compton is quite anxious about the political complexion of the next House. In any event, he says he is confident that he was fairly re-elected, and does not for a moment anticipate that a successful contest can be made against his title to a seat in the Fifty-first Congress.

The Katie Hines Takes a Prize.
Saturday, Capt. Thomas H. Ching, of the Oyster Police Stop Katie Hines captured and brought to Leonardtown the sloop Little Mary, of Crisfield, Lewis Christie, captain. In company with other boats, the Little Mary was detected dredging on "Old Week" bar, St. Clement's Bay, and after a short chase a well directed rifle ball from the Katie induced her to heave to and she was taken in charge. Justice J. F. Morgan heard the case and imposed a fine of \$50 upon Captain Christie and sentenced him to six (6) months in the House of Correction. The sentence to imprisonment was afterwards remitted.
During Capt. Ching's visit to the village he and different members of his crew took to the Katie frequently came to the mouth of our bay, that they stay in any one place was necessarily short; that as soon as the Police boat left for some other point the dredgers, who knew that she was away, would slip in and go to work. The Katie has a large territory to guard, is not ubiquitous and it is impossible for her to prevent all violations of the law. Last week we gave the tugmen's side; this week we are glad to give the police boat her innings.

Circuit Court Proceedings.

Monday, Dec. 3, 1888. The December Term of the Circuit Court for this county, began to-day, with his Honor Judge J. Parson Crane on the bench. The appearance docket was first called to its conclusion. The preliminary call of the trial docket was then proceeded with and judgments entered in uncontested cases. At 12 o'clock, in the call of the recognition docket was made and the cases thereon disposed of. There being no further business the Court then adjourned for the day.

Tuesday, Dec. 4, 1888. This being the day for the trial of appeals from Justices of the Peace, the appeal docket was called and all the cases disposed of. The peremptory call of the trial docket was then proceeded with to its conclusion. The case of the State vs. Thos. J. Yates, indicted at the September term, 1888, for assault on Henry Baer was then taken up, and a plea of guilty confessed and submitted to the Court. Judgment of Guilty and fine one dollar and costs. The Court then adjourned for the day, after discharging the officers of the Court for the term. The business of the term was virtually concluded to-day, but the Court will not formally adjourn for the term until to-morrow.

Our Oyster Navy.
Under the above caption the Baltimore Sunday Herald says that to our State Fishery Force, calling it a political machine and saying that it is composed not of warriors but of political henchmen. The article is a seven column one and too long for us to reproduce. It contains some inaccurate statements, but will doubtlessly do much good by causing the officers to be more particular in the discharge of their duty. The Herald fires on the "Navy" in general and takes a few shots at Flownan, Loker and others in particular. Of Captain Loker it says:
"Here is one of the many instances of the navy's shortcomings that might be quoted: Recently a police schooner met the steamer Governor Thomas on the bay and the captain of the steamer told Deputy Commander Loker that several dredgers were working on a forbidden bar a few miles distant.
"I tried to drive them off, but they refused to go, and I could not fight them successfully with my force, badly armed as it is."
"I'll go look at them," said Loker.
He did. When he was about two miles distant from the violators, who were within a half mile of the shore, whereas they should have been a mile and a-half away from it, the Thomas fired "a salute" to the schooner captain termed it. Immediately, the dredgers sailed down the bay.
"I looked at them," said Commander Loker. "I don't think they were violating the law."
"What's the matter with Loker?"
"He's all right," will, we trust, be the answer to the Herald's question when Captain Loker is heard from.
