

WEDNESDAY.

Mr. Edward Higgins, Jr. ex-Baltimore City Collector and treasurer of the Maryland Club is dead.

Hon. Henry G. Davis has returned to Baltimore from his visit to President-elect Harrison.

President and Mrs. Cleveland received Christmas remembrances from friends in all parts of the country.

The name of Stephen B. Elkins is mentioned for a place in Gen. Harrison's cabinet.

Much satisfaction with the administration and the navy is expressed on account of their prompt action in the Haytian difficulty.

A fire at Swanton coal mine, Allegany county, Md., will cause suspensions for ten days.

Unusually mild weather prevailed Christmas Day in nearly all parts of the country. Beautiful, mild southern weather characterized the day in New York, Philadelphia and other seaboard cities.

The steamboat John H. Hanna was burned near Plaquemine, La., on the Mississippi river. Many persons perished by fire and a large number were drowned.

A gray-haired man, over sixty years old, was arrested at New Madrid, Mo., yesterday, for robbing the sheriff's office of \$3,100 Saturday night. He had a complete outfit of burglar's tools, including large bunches of keys and several yards of fuse, and is thought to be an old professional. He gives his name as Carey.

A large number of employees of the Pottawomac Iron Company's nail factory at Pottawomac, Pa., who were discharged Monday night, held a meeting yesterday to decide as to whether to remain in Pottawomac or seek employment elsewhere. About 250 men were affected in all, including 150 nailers. Nothing definite was arrived at.

Commander Consigny, of the Iowa Department of the Grand Army of the Republic, has been looking up Union veterans among the evicted settlers of the Des Moines river lands in order to aid the needy. He finds there are few Union soldiers among them. There is a large number of ex-Confederates.

THURSDAY.

The sailors on the bark Madura, of Quebec, which arrived at Baltimore Wednesday, tell a wonderful yarn about having seen a ghost while at sea.

A review of the trade of Baltimore for 1888 shows that business has generally been satisfactory.

The schooner Mahoney, which was sunk in Chester river by the State Steamer McLane has been brought to Baltimore.

Capt. John Burns, charged with firing upon the steamer Corica, and also with boarding the State Sloop Groome, has been committed for the action of the Queen Anne and Dorchester authorities.

Gen. Logan's remains have been removed to the new chapel, Soldier's Home Cemetery, Washington.

Maryland Oyster dredging has not been active for several days. Charles Wright, colored, was shot and killed in Talbot county and John Turpin has been arrested charged with the shooting.

Gov. Wilson of West Virginia has issued commissions to John O. Pendleton and Wm. L. Wilson, democrats, Congressmen-elect from the first and second districts. Gov. Wilson says commissions to the other Congressmen will not be issued until he can do so according to law.

The Archdiocese of New York claims 800,000 Catholic population.

FRIDAY.

A writ of habeas corpus has been obtained in behalf of Capt. Burns charged with firing on the steamer Corica.

The Fifth Maryland Regiment will attend the inauguration at Washington, March 4.

William Patton was accidentally killed by a shot gun by John Dits near Alberton, Howard county.

Oyster dredging troubles are reported from Fishing Bay.

The wife of Judge Vinson, of Montgomery county is dead.

Late Chinese newspapers are full of rumors of the Mitkiewicz-Barker concessions. They say that Mr. Barker will receive the concessions, with Mitkiewicz left out, and that a protocol will soon be signed.

The Gunpowder River water has been turned into Lake Clifton and Baltimore's water supply has thereby been greatly improved and increased.

The letter sent by Cardinal Gibbons and the American Roman Catholic bishops to the Pope, with reference to the Washington University, announces that \$8,000,000 has been collected for the new institution, and that the buildings are now going up. The Cardinal and bishops request the concession of academic privileges to the University, and ask the Pope's approval of its statutes.

The brigantine Josefa which arrived at Philadelphia on Dec. 27th, reports that she was compelled to pay an unjust fine at Porto Rico and to suffer many indignities at the hands of the Government of the Island and his underlings. More work for the Galena and Yantic.
