#### St. Mary's Statistics.

From Comptroller Baughman's Report for the fiscal year ended Sept. 30, 1888 we gather the following:

J. Frank Ford, Clerk to the Circuit Court paid into the State Treasury \$2,118.12, as follows: Marriage Licenses, \$53.37; Traders Licenses, \$907.95; Traders Liquor Licenses, \$914.06; Ordinary Licenses, \$71.25; Oyster House Licenses, \$65; Interest, \$4.69; Tax on Civil Commissions, \$71.80.

James T. M. Raley, Register of Wills, paid \$491.81—\$41.18 interest; \$264.68 tax on commissions of Extra and Admra, and \$132.95 tax on collateral inheritances. Total Receipts of Register's office for one year from Dec. 1, 1887, were \$1,100.

John E. Abell, late Register, paid \$717.69 for tax on commissions of Executors and administrators.

The report of Danl. C. Hammett, State's Attorney, shows total receipts for year ending January 1, 1888, to have been \$991.66. For the year ended Sept. 30, 1888, St. Mary's received, on account of School tax, \$12,995.94.

The report shows a considerable amount due from Collectors.

Mr. John W. Reuehan, of Howard, is on a visit to his "Bushwood" estate in this county. We hear that he contemplates rebuilding Plowmen's Wharf and has bargained with Mr. G. G. Hill to do the work.

**Resolutions in Memory of Prof. Paul Combs.**  
Drowned near Leonardtown, Md., December 27, 1888.  
Adopted by the Faculty and Students of the Maryland Agricultural College.

Resolved, That in the death of Prof. Paul Combs, the Maryland Agricultural College has lost one of its most valued instructors and brightest ornaments; that the Faculty have lost a colleague who, although the youngest of them all, was esteemed by them as wise and strong beyond his years, while he was also endeared to them by his never-failing gentleness, courtesy, purity and brotherly helpfulness; that the students have lost a faithful friend and teacher whose virtues they will emulate and whose devotion to their interests they will always remember with gratitude and affection.

Resolved, That a crayon portrait of Prof. Combs be procured and suitably placed in the College, and that it be draped in mourning during the remainder of this session.  
Resolved, That these resolutions be published in the Baltimore, Washington and Leonardtown papers, and that an engrossed copy be presented to the family of Prof. Combs, with the assurance of our deepest sympathy in their distress and irreparable loss.

**Mr. Compton's Answer.**  
Representative Compton has filed his answer to Mr. Mudd's motion of contest. He denies that the official certificates and statements made out by the judges of election under their hands in the several districts and election precincts of the fifth congressional district of Maryland on the books of the polls, and attested by the clerks of election, or one of them in each of said election districts, is so soon as the votes or ballots were counted and the number for each candidate reckoned up and ascertained, show that Mr. Mudd received a plurality of votes as Representative. He also denies that Mr. Mudd received 16,379 votes under the description of Sydney E. Mudd, one vote under description of S. E. Mudd, one vote as S. N. Mudd and one vote as Mudd.

Mr. Compton admits that the judges of election in the fifth and ninth districts of Charles county, by mistake, placed the poll-books, certificates and statements in the ballot-boxes, but he denies that Mr. Mudd has correctly given the votes of these election districts. He denies further that Mr. Mudd received 1,169 votes in Calvert county, and insists that the poll-books will not show it. He claims the return judges of St. Mary's county acted properly in not including in their return a vote cast for "S. E. Mudd" and one cast for "Mudd."

Mr. Compton also denies that the election in the first precinct of the third election district of Anne Arundel county was interfered with by democratic partisans not resident voters and that at least 176 re-

By the Honorable the Judges in the first district of Howard county failed to return one vote cast for him; that a man voted twice for Mudd in the eighth election district of Anne Arundel county. He claims that persons fraudulently perjured legal votes in Anne Arundel county and voted for Mudd; also, that a number of votes were cast for him (Compton) in Baltimore county, but were not returned and counted for him. He alleges that undue influence was used in St. Mary's county, which prevented persons from voting for him. In conclusion, Mr. Compton avers that there was not a legal election held in the eighth district of Anne Arundel county, and charges that the judges of election, of whom a majority were republicans, allowed persons to vote whose names did not appear on the poll-books; that the said judges upon verbal statement of William F. Penchridge, a republican office-holder, that the names were on the list in his possession, permitted persons to vote, although their names were not on the poll-books.—Washington Correspondence of Baltimore Sun.
