"Jim," a young buck of the Seminoles, went crazy in the everglades of Florida, and with a Winchester rifle shot seven men. He was finally killed.

The man who committed suicide in Madrid Friday has been fully identified as Richard Pigott, the perjurer and forger of the letters upon which the London Times' articles on "Parnellism and Crime" were based.

It is rumored in naval circles at Kiel, the German naval station on the Baltic, that a conflict has taken place in Samoa waters between an American man-of-war and the German corvette Olga, but Secretary Bayard has heard nothing of it, and says it is highly improbable.
