From the Baltimore Sun.

WEDNESDAY.

Richard Piggott, who furnished the alleged crinating letters of Parnell and the other Irish leaders to the London Times has confessed that he forged them, and has fled to avoid arrest.

James Graham Pearre, who was charged with attempting a felonious assault on Mrs. Estelle Kirkland, has been pursuing his studies at the Oxford Law School, England.

Hon. Wm. Windom, who is said to be booked for Secretary of the Treasury under the new administration, was in Baltimore.

Pitcher Kilroy has signed to play with the Baltimore Base-Ball Club this season.

The Maryland Court of Appeals decides that the Garrett county School Commissioners appointed by the Governor are the legal board.

Two vessels were taken to Annapolis on the charge of illegal dredging at Thomas's Point.

Henry S. Black was convicted at Frederick of abducting a young girl.

Judge McSherry, at Frederick, gave warning that he would not hesitate to pass the death sentence upon persons convicted of setting fire to buildings.

Barn-burning notices have created much excitement in the vicinity of Emmitsburg.

Brig-Gen. O. B. Wilcox has been appointed governor of the Soldiers' Home at Washington.

The United States Senate, yesterday, passed the army appropriation bill in an amended form. One of the amendments appropriates \$25,000 for a counterpoise battery on the Potomac river, below Washington. The House passed the deficiency appropriation bill and took up the Indian appropriation bill. Mr. Kennedy, of Ohio, made a bitter political speech, and was effectively replied to by Messrs. Crisp and Turner, of Georgia, and Breckinridge, of Arkansas. Mr. Springer introduced a bill providing for the admission of the Territories of Arizona, Idaho and Wyoming as States.

THURSDAY.

Attorney-Gen. Webster announced to the Parnell commission yesterday that the commission would not be asked to consider the genuineness of the alleged Parnell letters, and that the Times would apologize.

The national convention of republican clubs will be held in Baltimore to day. Delegates arrived yesterday and a number of preliminary arrangements were made.

It is thought the Rev. Dr. P. L. Chapelle will succeed the Right Rev. John J. Keane as Bishop of Richmond.

Gov. Jackson decided that Isaac Keenan shall be imprisoned in the penitentiary and not hanged.

The trial of John James Van Fossen for killing Augustus Porter was begun at Frederick.

Incendiary fires destroyed a hay barn at Westminster and Michael Zimmerman's store at Ernestville, Washington county.

President Cleveland entertained Mr. and Mrs. Harrison at dinner.

There is said to be a prospect of the confirmation of some of President Cleveland's more important appointments.

Robt. Logan is on trial for wife-murder in Washington.

The United States Senate yesterday passed a bill removing the political disabilities of Henry A. Ramsey, of Maryland. The House passed the Indian Appropriation bill. It is the last of the general appropriation bills.

Ex-U. S. Senator John W. Johnson died yesterday at his home in Richmond.

Next June Pennsylvanians will vote on prohibition and the abolition of the poll tax for voters.

Boss Platt will not go to the inauguration of General Harrison.

Miss Essie Weaver, aged 16 years, was arrested and is alleged to have confessed setting fire to the barn of her stepmother, Mrs. Peggy Wentz, near Lineboro, Carroll county, Md. Levi Herr, charged with firing, on February 19th, the barn of his father, John Herr, near Hanover, was released on \$2,000 bail for the Adame Co. (Pa.) Quarter Sessions Court.
