Recently, a State Convention of representative colored men assembled in Baltimore and adopted "an Address" of which the following is a synopsis:

The address asks the Legislature to strike out the words white and negro from the laws of the State wherever they occur. It also asks that at least one school in every county be opened for ten months of the year for both white and colored children; that all children between 6 and 20 years of age be admitted into any public school whose studies they are capable of pursuing; that there shall be one or more schools in each election district where colored persons between 6 and 20 years may be instructed, and from which no one shall be excluded; that a common fund be appropriated according to the respective population of the white and colored people; that the entire law which prohibits the marriage of a white person and a negro, or descendant of a negro to the third generation, be repealed; that colored youths of both sexes be admitted to the State Normal School and the Maryland Agricultural College; that the Legislature be asked to erase all unjust discrimination and pass a civil rights bill that colored teachers be employed for colored schools.

In sections where the colored population is too small to justify the establishment of schools for the colored children, they ask that the doors of the schools already in existence for white children be opened to them.

As the large majority of the republican party of Maryland is made up of colored voters it is to be presumed that the above is theirs and their party's creed. The Convention was well attended, Baltimore City and many of the counties being represented.

After other Maryland delegations had made ineffectual efforts to see President Harrison, our esteemed contemporary, General Agnew, and our eminent Republican fellow-citizen, Mr. Leon Seliger, called at the White House yesterday and were promptly admitted to the Executive presence. Once there they decanted eloquently upon the fitness of Mr. George T. Baggs for the Internal Revenue Collectorship, and were listened to with profound attention by the President. As intimated by Mr. Harrison, there are other Richmonds in the field, but with the backing which he enjoys, it is believed that Mr. Baggs will capture the coveted prize.—*Baltimore Herald.*

Senatorial honors sit lightly upon Chace, of Rhode Island, and it is but fair that some of the rest of the cotton magnates of that pocket-borough State should be given an opportunity to study the ceiling of the Senate chamber and the mysteries of the Senate committee-rooms. It is not in justice to Mr. Chace to affirm that his resignation of his Senatorial dignity is among the most noteworthy of his services to the public. Many of his conferees might follow his example and the people would thereby be gainers.

Editor Halstead says this is a free country, and that every honest man who wants an office is at liberty to do his best to get it. This is true; and it is also true that every scamp who wants an office has the same liberty of action. But an honest man, who puts in his time in raising turnips or weaving cloth or making the sparks fly from his anvil, had better stick to it and let the office hunt him instead of hunting the office. The poorest business going is the business of serving the public.

Coal consumers will be gratified to know that at a recent meeting of representatives of the six great coal producing companies of this country, a reduction was effected of fifty cents per ton in stove and upon other grades proportionately. The new prices are grate \$3.75; egg, \$3.90; stone, \$4.15, and chestnut \$4. The new schedule is from ten to fifteen cents lower than the Spring prices of 1888.

First Assistant Postmaster-General Clarkson will carry a strong new broom into the postal department, and it is expected that the annihilation of the Democratic fourth-class postmasters will be immediate and complete. Mr. Clarkson, it may be observed, is no stickler for civil service reform, either in letter or spirit.—*Herald.*

Senator Gorman has been elected vice-chairman of the caucus of Democratic Senators at Washington. This is a high compliment to Mr. Gorman's political ability and sagacity.

The defeat of the Prohibition amendment to the New Hampshire Constitution by such a decided majority was a surprise to both its supporters and opponents. Within the past two years Prohibitive amendments have been beaten in five States.

### FRIDAY.

John S. Clarkson, of Iowa, has been appointed First Assistant Postmaster-General.

A Maryland delegation in the interest of ex-Collector Sellman failed to get access to the President.

The changes in commanders of the Maryland oyster steamers have gone into effect.

John A. Kason, Wm. W. Phelps and George H. Bates have been selected as delegates to the Samoan conference.

Advices from Samoa show that there was no basis for the sensational rumor of the sinking of the United States man-of-war Nipah.

The brig Agnes Barton, of Baltimore, homeward bound from Navassa with phosphate, was wrecked yesterday afternoon on Virginia Beach and Capt. Humphrey B. Knight, of Baltimore, and five of the crew were drowned.

George C. Hayden, aged 75 years and supposed to be very poor, died in a cheap boarding-house in St. Louis, but among his effects was found the key of a safe deposit box which contained over \$60,000 in securities.

The Supreme Court of West Virginia has decided that R. S. Carr, President of the Senate, has no ground upon which to take the office of Governor. This gives Wilson the chair until the contest will have been settled between Gen. Goff and Judge Fleming.

There were 261 business failures reported in the United States last week.

The President had a large number of callers yesterday in search of offices.

Governor Jackson wants the Fifth Regiment to act as his escort at the Washington inaugural.

Major S. S. Rockwood, of Wisconsin, has been appointed chief clerk of the Department of Agriculture, and J. Scanlan chief of the bureau of statistics, State Department.

A large batch of nominations are expected to go to the Senate to-day.

Ex-President Cleveland will start to-day on his trip to Cuba, via Washington, D. C., and St. Augustine, Florida.

Senators Ingalls and Plumb claim the Assistant Secretaryship of the Interior for Kansas.

General Adam E. King, of Baltimore, wants to be collector of internal revenue, and is strongly backed for the place.

It is understood that Gov. Wilson will call the West Virginia Legislature in extra session about the first of June.

Blanche Gray, aged 32 years, died at the Maryland University Hospital Baltimore, from the effect of four wounds around her neck, for inflicting which William Shannon was arrested and sent to jail. The woman was cut at her home, 672 Penn alley, Saturday night.

E. Hanna Calder and Catherine Beall, of Federal Hill, Harford county, have been separated by Mrs. Calder's or Miss Beall's father. They were found at Woodsburg, Baltimore county, where Calder now is.

The steamer Walla Walla, of San Francisco, was seized by customs officers for omitting proper entries of freight on inward manifest. Four barrels, supposed to contain opium, were found to be filled with opium, valued at nearly \$10,000.

A fire at Orange C. H., Va., destroyed a number of business houses causing a loss of over \$50,000, and another at Winchester destroyed several buildings; loss \$12,000. Both fires are believed to have been of incendiary origin.

Gov. Taft, of Rhode Island, Saturday received a letter of resignation of his office of United States Senator from the Hon. Jonathan Chase. It will be read to the General Assembly on Monday. Mr. Chase gives as the reason for his resignation the insufficiency of the compensation of Senators. The matter has given rise to a discussion of the subject of salaries. Senator Platt and others say a Senator cannot live in Washington in anything like the style or comfort he enjoys at home.
