[Special Correspondence of the Beacon.] The Rt. Revd. Bishop Paret visited the different Parishes in the county during the past week and administered the Rite of Confirmation to such applicants as were presented to him by the several ministers.

He officiated in All Faith Parish on Wednesday, and in King and Queen Parish on Thursday, but have not learned how many were confirmed in said Parishes.

On Friday he officiated at St. Andrew's Church and confirmed 8 persons, and in the afternoon of same day he was at St. Peter's Leonardtown, and confirmed 4 applicants.

On Saturday he visited William and Mary Parish, Poplar Hill Church, where a class of 5 were confirmed. On Sunday he was at St. Mary's City, Trinity Church, and confirmed 8 persons, and in the afternoon he visited St. Mary's Chapel, near Point Lookout, where 13 were confirmed.

This ended the Bishop's visitation in the county, and he left on Monday for Baltimore. At all these Churches the congregations were large, and the Bishop preached able, sound and logical sermons, his sermon on Sunday morning, on the Holy Trinity, being especially strong, masterly and scholarly.

Among his hearers were President Harrison, Secretaries Blaine and Windom, who paid marked attention, and seemed very favorably impressed with the services throughout.
