SATURDAY.
The Crescent Democratic Society of Baltimore last night discussed a declaration as to the political views of a majority of its members. The meeting was a stormy one, and ended in the resolutions being laid over until next week.
Chief Judge George Yellott retired from the bench of the third judicial circuit, having reached the prescribed age of 70 years.
The condition of Capt. Blake, who was stabbed at Camden, N. J., is improved.

Both the United States and France are trying to get possession of Inagua Island, Hayti, for a coaling station, and it is thought their conflicting claims may result in trouble.
Ex-President Cleveland is denominated in New York "the anti-tariff, anti-trust candidate."
The indications are that the price of sugar will be put up yet higher for both raw and refined.

Railroad earnings continue to show an increase.
In a dispatch to the Hagerstown Mail President Gambrell, of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal, says: "The gentlemen from Williamsport made no definite proposals for repairing the upper part of the canal; therefore, none were declined on our part."
Robert Rue, colored, watchman at McCormick's feed stable, St. Louis, shot and killed a white man named Charles Love about midnight last night. Rue claims Love was trespassing.

Burglars entered C. B. Lawber's dry goods store in the heart of Trenton, N. J. at an early hour yesterday morning and carried off \$2,000 worth of silks.
SUNDAY-MONDAY.
President Harrison has returned to Deer Park.
Democratic primaries will be held in Frederick county August 31 and a county Convention September 7.
The National Guard of the District of Columbia will go into camp at Ft. Washington, Md., on the Potomac river, to-day.

The West Virginia gubernatorial contest committee have disposed of the contested votes in several more counties. Fleming's gain, so far, is 68 votes.
President Gambrell, of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal, will shortly call a meeting of the directors, to whom he will explain the serious condition of the canal's affairs.
Philadelphia merchants who contributed largely to the last republican presidential campaign will, it is said, be benefited by a decision regarding the importation of worsteds, woollens and wool waste.

The Harford county democratic primaries resulted in the choice of Benjamin Silver, Jr. for State Senator, and Noble Mitchell, W. W. Preston, William B. Hopkins and George W. Richardson for members of the House of Delegates.
The result of the Virginia republican conference at Washington is construed as indicating that Gen. Mahone will run the campaign and that he will have the active aid and sympathy of the administration.
It has been brought to light that ex-Speaker Randall was anxious to effect an agreement with tariff reform democrats in the last presidential campaign.

The collector of customs at New York decides that while immigrants are able-bodied and willing to work they are entitled to land, even though shipped to these shores by governments or persons desirous of getting rid of them.
Burglars broke into the postoffice at Susquehanna, Pa., Friday night, and gaining access to the safe, robbed it of several hundred dollars in cash and stamps.

A firm in Chicago engaged in the manufacture of tin cans and japanned ware has patented an invention which competent judges say will revolutionize the tin and steel industry of the world. It is a process by which molten metal may be rolled into any desired shape, thus saving all intermediate processes.
Mrs. Julia Skobieskie, wife of a Hungarian employed on a farm, near St. Lawrence, a small village three miles from Reading, Pa., was out on the Alsea Hills Friday picking blackberries when she was bitten by a copperhead snake. Thoroughly frightened she ran for home, where she gave birth to three female children, all of whom are living.

A general strike was inaugurated Saturday among the laborers in West Superior, Wis., and over 600 are out. The demand for an increase from \$1.50 to \$1.75. They visited the coal docks, where 14 men were working at the 40-cent-an-hour rate under police protection. They overpowered the police and routed the men. The strike has an ugly look, as the men are determined and the contractors equally so.

The ranks at Camp Jackson are being thinned out in consequence of clerks being called back to their desks.
Several of the new vessels of the navy will take part in the bombardment of Fort McHenry during the September exposition.
Two arrests have been made in Washington county for alleged horse-stealing.
John Carter, colored, shot and fatally wounded Constable Reynolds at Hinton, West Virginia, Saturday, and was lynched by a mob Sunday morning.

The result of the investigation into the efficacy of electricity as an instrument of death will probably result in the repeal of the New York law providing for the execution of criminals by electricity because of its uncertainty and probable cruelty.

Hon. Samuel J. Randall has been again prostrated by illness.
