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great bulk of our people to keep their property from the block of the auctioneer, that so large a portion of our taxes should be squandered in patching and re-patching our roads—the only idea of the expenditure seeming to be connected with the furtherance of the schemes of the party that happens to be in power by a sort of pensioning system—the most worthless of our people being as a rule the recipients instead of the needy, and the pay being not to remedy distress but either for party work done or bargained for. Unless we can be roused so far as to require of our public officials a more honest distribution of our money placed in their hands for a fixed purpose and shamelessly perverted to shamless uses, there is no use in discussing this question. The remedy is not, it would seem, the change of the law upon the subject, but rather in the change of public sentiment upon the proper execution of such law as we already have. New laws would probably only give some new channels of squandering money or some offices of larger perquisites, unless public sentiment can be roused so far as that there shall be a demand that will be listened to by our County Commissioners requiring honest distribution of the money collected for road purposes.

Each being my view, I would suggest that a general meeting of the people of the county be called to consider this question. Such a meeting could select a committee (selected without regard to party) to report on some road system and some definite system of road expenditures that would meet the requirements of the present. The two parties could surely unite in pledging the members of the next Levy Court to carry out the wishes of the people expressed in Mass Meeting.

All legislation, if I mistake not, that we can need we already have. The Levy Court has the matter entirely in its own hands. Let the people then, regardless of party distinctions, speak out plainly, and it may result not only in remedying the matter specially complained of, but may have the incidental effect of giving us as candidates for the County only such men as the people of the county feel they can trust. T.

The September Term of the Circuit Court for this county began its session on Monday, the 16th instant, with Hon. J. Parran Crane, Associate Judge, on the bench. Capt. George Thomas was selected by the Court as Foreman of the Grand Jury. After the drawing of the jury by the Clerk and the empanelling of the Grand Jury, His Honor Judge Crane delivered the charge to the latter body defining their duties and obligations and explaining the nature of the crimes that they would probably be called upon to investigate.

The appearance docket was next called and the preliminary call of the trial docket was made and judgments entered in uncontested cases. The preliminary call of the appeal docket was next made and cases marked for trial. At 12 o'clock, the recognition docket was called. Mr. A. Kingsley Love was admitted to the bar. There being no cases ready for trial the Court, at 1 o'clock, p. m. took a recess, and at 3 o'clock, adjourned for the day.
