The New Hampshire republican caucus last night chose Dr. Jacob H. Gallinger as the successor of Hon. Henry W. Blair in the United States Senate.

In the United States Senate, yesterday, Mr. Everts spoke for over three hours in advocacy of the passage of the election bill.

The United States Senate was again engaged on the election bill yesterday. Senators Hampton and Penco spoke against the bill and Mr. Dixon supported it.

Secretary Noble says he is in favor of the Indians working for their living like other people.

Several of the "Silver Senators" on the republican side are not to be counted on by the opponents of the force bill.

The British steamship Yoxford rounded the crew of the steamship Carlin, which sank at sea January 13.

Speaker Reed will do all he can to prevent the passage of the silver coinage bill, and that if it passes President Harrison will undoubtedly veto it.

S., known as the Dependent Pension Bill, the parent or parents of every soldier of ninety days service during the late rebellion who died in service or from wounds or diseases contracted during service, provided said parent has no other means of support than their own manual labor is entitled to pension.

Every soldier of ninety days service with an honorable discharge is entitled to a pension— the former during her widowhood and the latter until she shall have arrived at sixteen years of age.
