Field Marshal Count von Moltke died at 9:45 o'clock on the 24th inst. of heart failure. His death was entirely unexpected as he had attended the session of the Reichstag held in the afternoon.

Count Helmuth Karl Bernhard von Moltke, General and Field Marshal of the Prussian army, was one of the oldest and most distinguished soldiers of modern times.

The Legislature of Maryland, at its session in 1890, passed six amendments to the Constitution, which are to be voted on by the people next fall.

1st.—Governor's Veto Power.—According to the present interpretation of the Constitution the Governor must approve or reject an appropriation bill as a whole.

2d.—Corporations.—This amendment is proposed to prevent all except municipal or bank corporations from being created in any other mode than under the general laws, and also to compel any existing corporation seeking an amendment of its charter to surrender all claim to exemption from taxation and to exemption from repeal or modification of its charter.

3.—Taxes.—This is one of the most important amendments proposed. It declares that all taxes should be uniform upon all kinds of property and should be levied and collected under general laws.

4th.—County Commissioners.—This amendment provides that County Commissioners shall be elected on the general ticket of each county, commencing in 1891, and for such periods, not exceeding six years, as may be prescribed by law.

5th.—Board of Public Works.—This amendment is intended to give the Board of Public Works authority to sell the State's interest in all works of internal improvement and in banks and other corporations, under such regulations and conditions as may be prescribed by the General Assembly.

6th.—Taxation of Personal Property.—This amendment proposes to tax personal property of the residents of this State, in the county or State, where they bona fide reside for the greater part of the year, for which the tax is levied, and not elsewhere, except goods and chattels permanently located, which are to be taxed in county or city where they are so located.

The republicans propose to capture Brooklyn from the democrats by nominating Eugene O'Connor for mayor.

Miss Gabrielle Greeley, daughter of Horace Greeley, and Rev. F. M. Clendennis were married at Pleasantville, N. Y.

Abe Halley was killed by Jack Chiles at Diana, Tenn., Wednesday night. Some weeks ago they quarreled in a debating society.

Louis L. Miller, aged fourteen years, was arrested last night, charged with stabbing and killing Milton W. Wood, aged seventeen years, corner of Fort avenue and Oberlin street, South Baltimore.

Laborers at the Gilbert Hodge & Co. lumber yard, Burlington, Va., drank freely of water from an old well in the vicinity, and, as a result of poison from sewage, five of them are dead and several others are not expected to live.

During a balloon ascension of a circus at Lexington Va., Tuesday, a colored man who was assisting in starting the balloon was caught in the ropes, carried up some distance, and then dropped. He was insensible when picked up, and it is doubtful if he can recover.

Mrs. Isabella Smith Cooper, supposed to be the oldest gypsy in this country, died at South Hadley Falls, Mass., Tuesday night, aged ninety-five years. She was born in England, but spent seventy-five years of her life in the United States.

The New Orleans grand jury has about finished its investigation of the lynching of the murderers of Chief of Police Hennessey. A large number of witnesses have been examined. It is expected a comprehensive report and several indictments will soon be forthcoming.

Andrew Blashko, a Hunarian striker, and his wife were shot by the sheriff of Fayette county, Pa., yesterday while resisting eviction at Monarch, in the coke regions. The wife was in the act of firing at the officer with a pistol and the husband attacked him with a club. Martin Scrymgeour was shot in the mouth and badly wounded.

Dick Liddell, once a member of the famous James gang, now a wealthy horse owner on Eastern tracks, was arrested and lodged in jail at Richmond, Mo., yesterday. He is charged with the murder of Wood Hite, a cousin of Jesse James. The crime was committed in 1883, and was the outgrowth of a feud existing among several members of the gang.

Hon. E. R. Stackhouse member of Congress from South Carolina, made a lengthy speech to the Texas Farmers' Alliance at Waco yesterday, advising the alliance to submit their claims to both the great parties and avoid the third party, but in the event of failure in securing their demands from either party, to then think of a third-party movement.

The magazine of the Italian army at Pozzo Panaleo, three miles from Rome, containing 250 tons of powder, exploded yesterday morning. A number of persons were killed and over 100 injured. The city of Rome shook to its foundations. The cupola of the Houses of Parliament collapsed, many buildings were reduced to ruins and the interiors of old palaces and churches were considerably injured.

In the Vatican buildings historical stand-glass windows were shattered. Great consternation prevailed for a time among the people of the city, who rushed into the streets terrified, believing an earthquake shock had caused the disaster.

SATURDAY, April 25. The German army, is dead. There are 14 candidates for United States Senator from the Eastern Shore. Argument in the first of the Archer bond cases was concluded yesterday in the Maryland Court of Appeals.

The United States fish commission expects to hatch one hundred millions of young shad at Gloucester. James Craney, colored, was hanged at Lexington, Va., for the murder of James Oliver, also colored.

Geiselman & Son's furniture establishment in Westminster was burned. Loss, \$12,000; insured. Two suits were instituted in Washington by the trustees to recover land claimed to belong to the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company.

Two boys stole a keg of whiskey in Brooklyn and drank so much of it that one died and the other is not expected to recover. A daring bicycle rider has just performed the feat of riding over the roof of a building in Hagerstown, the angle of which is about 45 degrees.

Fire caused several thousand dollars' damage at Kent Island and serious injury to Mrs. D. Beltzel and her daughter, who were brought to Baltimore for medical treatment. A woman was found murdered and mutilated in a New York down town hotel after the manner of the victims of the Whitechapel fiend in London.

Near New Jefferson, Ohio, Lorenzo Coleman, a lunatic, fatally shot his sister and dangerously shot the hired man, named Oloman, and wounded his mother slightly with a shotgun. W. S. Turnbull, of Birmingham, Ala., went fishing a few days ago with dynamite. The cartridge with which he proposed to shock the fish to death went off before its time, blowing off one of Turnbull's arms and seriously injured him otherwise.

The dwelling of Henry Chick, in Potomac-district, Montgomery county, was burned at night lately with all its contents, and the family, who had retired, barely escaped with what they wore. The loss is estimated at \$1,300, partially covered by insurance. P. T. Barnum, after making his will in 1882, summoned several prominent physicians to examine his mental condition and to make affidavits to his sanity, which they did. This was to guard against any possible contest upon the plea of incapacity.

The President and his party of travelers spent yesterday afternoon and evening at Santa Barbara, Cal. Beautiful floral displays greeted the party at every stopping-place. Business was generally suspended, and the people gave themselves up to demonstrations in the President's honor. Secretary Blaine is reported to be indignant at the Forsaker episode in

the republican league convention at Cincinnati. There is said to be a perfect understanding between President Harrison and Mr. Blaine, and that Mr. Blaine heartily desires the re-nomination of the President.

Fred Fesser, a farmer near Bourbon, Ind., exploded a dynamite cartridge yesterday under a stump while he was standing not far away with a basket of dynamite cartridges on his arm. The cartridges in the basket were exploded by the concussion and the man was instantly killed, being torn to pieces. His dog came to the scene and defied approach to the remains. He was shot before the remains could be gathered.

MONDAY, April 27. United States Senator John H. Reagan, of Texas, has resigned, to accept a position on the Texas Railroad commission.

Dr. Wm. Shiller, druggist, corner Charles and Montgomery streets, Baltimore, committed suicide by shooting himself Saturday.

Lieutenant-Colonel Wilmer has assumed command First Maryland Regiment and regimental headquarters have been removed from Hagerstown to La Plata, Charles county.

Governor McKinney will leave Richmond, Va., May 4, to meet Governor Jackson at Christiani, Md. They will make a tour of inspection of the oyster grounds and talk over the boundary question.

Mr. J. S. Clark, who has been elected President of the Association of Republican clubs, is conceded to be a remarkably shrewd organizer, and democratic leaders are admonished to keep their eyes on him.

D. J. Hunt, who killed Private Miller in a gambling quarrel, Wednesday night at Walla Walla, Wash., was lynched Friday night by the soldiers from the garrison. The soldiers took possession of the town, captured the jail and took Hunt to the court house and shot him.

A large tobacco barn on the farm of Mr. Samuel J. Hammett, together with about 10,000 pounds of tobacco, was totally destroyed by fire in Calvert county Thursday evening, partly insured. The origin of the fire is a mystery, as no one had occasion to be in or about the building during the afternoon.

The colored republicans of Calvert county have resolved to support no man for officer who was engaged four years ago in helping to defeat republican candidates by using "pasters" to cover republicans with names of democratic nominees. They also resolved to support no candidate who is also a lover or leaser of the oyster rocks.

The war-ship Blanco Encalada, which was one of the vessels taken possession of by the insurgents at the breaking out of the insurrection at Chili, was sunk on April 23 in Caldera bay by a torpedo fired by the new gun-boat Almirante Lynch. The destruction of the vessel was caused by great loss of life, 290 persons, comprising half of her crew, being killed by the explosion of the torpedo. The congress party are now in possession of Caldera and Carrizal.

TUESDAY, April 28. Chaucey M. Dewey advocates the re-nomination of President Harrison. Ground was broken yesterday for the Grant monument in Riverside Park, N. Y. Gen. Alfred J. Pleasanton, of blue glass fame, was accidentally injured in Philadelphia.

The public reception to Senator Gorman will take place May 14 at Fifth Regiment Armory. The President of Chili is in such dread of food except that prepared by his mother. Congressman Clinch, of California, says the democrats of his State fear Mr. Cleveland's record against the free coinage of silver would lose him votes in event of his nomination for President.

The Supreme Court of Louisiana has decided the lottery mandamus case in favor of the lottery company. This decision establishes the amendment to the Louisiana constitution extending the franchise of the company for twenty-five years. The old log cabin in St. Louis county, Missouri, which the late General and President U. S. Grant erected with his own hands, and with logs cut and hewn by himself is about to be removed from its present site and shipped to Chicago, where it will be re-erected for exhibition at the World's Fair.
