Associate Justice Joseph P. Bradley, of the Supreme Court of the United States, died yesterday morning at his home in Washington, aged seventy-eight years.

At Nottingham, Eng., a widow named Castings, who kept a millinery shop, murdered her two children by battering their heads with a coal hammer and then took her own life.

Over twenty lives were lost by the burning of the National Surgical Institute at Indianapolis on Thursday night. The work of clearing the ruins is not yet complete, and it is probable more bodies will be found. Most of the victims were crippled, under treatment in the institute for their deformities.

William Nunnally, a grandson of Dr. and Mrs. J. H. Barrett, the aged couple who were brutally murdered several weeks ago at Creswell, Ga., has been arrested as an accomplice in the crime. He has been implicated by a statement of Samuel Kendall, colored, who has also been arrested.

Carrie Hoffman, aged eighteen years, a housemaid at the home of Prof. J. G. Anderson, superintendent of the school at Phillipsburg, Pa., retired on Tuesday evening in her usual health. Since that time she has not awakened. She has been sleeping seventy-two hours, and all efforts of physicians to arouse her have been in vain.

A movement for a new constitutional convention is said to be impending in the Legislature.

A petition to the Legislature from the bondsmen of Archer for relief will be presented.

Seven skaters broke through the ice at Annapolis and were with difficulty rescued from drowning.

The funeral services of the late Associate Justice Bradley, in accordance with his wishes, were plain and simple in the extreme. His remains were taken to Newark, N. J., for interment.

It is expected the President's message and the Chilian correspondence will be sent to Congress today, and that unless Chili makes repatriation in a few days diplomatic relations will be broken off.

Representative Stump, of Maryland, has prepared a stringent bill against Chinese immigration, which he will submit to the House committee on immigration at an early day.

A special dispatch from Reading, Pa., says: "Postmaster-General Wanamaker has removed Levi S. Shirk, postmaster at Margantown this county, and appointed Samuel Deichley in his place. Recently charges were preferred against Shirk that he had adversely criticised President Harrison."

It was developed on Saturday that J. J. Nicholson & Sons had rehypothecated collateral securities left with them by a client of ex-Gov. William Pinkney Whyte. The court was asked to decree the sale of the real estate of the late Andrew J. Nicholson for the benefit of the creditors of the firm. As a result of the failure cross-actions were instituted by the Western National Bank and William Reisinger & Sons.

The south-bound Missouri Pacific train was captured twice Saturday night, once by a lynching party that was escorting murderer Robert Helper from Nevada, Mo., to Lamar, Mo., where they hanged him, and a second time by train robbers, who robbed the express car and its inmates. One of the robbers killed S. B. Clemore, a colored policeman, who tried to arrest him and a companion, at Fort Scott, and a telegraphic order. The two robbers entered a box car on a freight train that was pulling out. Detectives followed on a passenger train, and at Pleasanton overtook them. Both began firing at the officers, and in the fusillade one of the robbers was killed and the other seriously wounded. The murdered man is Charles Myers. His companion is S. C. Francis. The robbers secured only about \$75. Both are from Kansas City.
