NEWS IN BRIEF.

From the Baltimore Sun.

Saturday, Feb. 6th 1892.

Hon. David A. Wells, of Connecticut, the father of tariff reform and the great political economist, has written a letter endorsing the Springer policy of attacking the McKinley high tariff by separate bills.

The election committee of the House of Representatives by a vote of 10 to 3, decided to unseat Stewart, republican, from the Twenty-fourth district of Pennsylvania...

LEGISLATURE.

Mr. Hubner's primary election law for Baltimore county was passed in the Senate.

Senator Getty introduced a bill granting additional privileges to the Baltimore and Cumberland Railroad Company.

Mr. Collins' bill providing for the taxation of mortgages was made the order of the day for Tuesdays next at 12.30.

Mr. Collins has introduced a bill providing for the annual listing of personal property and the listing of all real property every ten years.

The bill repealing the Eastern Shore law was made the order of the day for March 15 in the Maryland House of Delegates...

Monday, Feb. 8th 1892.

Governor Brown, of Maryland, is in favor of using part of the State library-rooms at Annapolis for the preservation of records and relics.

Tammany is said to be growing apprehensive about the popular protest against the early State convention, fearing it may develop into a formidable revolt against the local machine.

Gov. John M. Thayer, republican, wrote to Gov. James E. Boyd, democrat, yesterday, that he would hand over the office of Governor of Nebraska today in compliance with the decision of the Supreme Court of the United States.

Hon. James G. Blaine, Secretary of State, announces in a letter to Hon. J. S. Clark, chairman of the republican national committee, that he is not a candidate for the presidency and that his name will not go before the convention.

Senator Hill's friends in Washington express the opinion that he has proceeded too far in advancing his presidential interests in New York to retreat; others who have watched his career closely think his last step in ordering a midwinter convention may be fatal to his ambition.

Tuesday, Feb. 9th 1892.

Mr. Blaine's letter of declination has greatly encouraged Senator Callum and other presidential aspirants, but the general impression seems to be that President Harrison will be the republican nominee.

United States Judge Morris heard argument on the question whether United States supervisors of election are authorized by law to scrutinize the ballots of illiterate and physically incapable voters, and will file a written opinion later.

Hon. James E. Boyd, democrat, who was elected Governor of Nebraska last fall, but who has been kept out of the office by the republicans on the ground that he was not a naturalized citizen, took possession of the office yesterday. Governor Thayer, the republican hold-over Governor, offered his hand, but Governor Boyd declined to recognize him in any way.

Bills for the survey of the Virginia oyster grounds were presented in both houses of the Virginia Legislature. Governor McKinney transmitted to the Legislature resolutions from the Maryland Legislature suggesting a legislative conference with the view of securing concurrent legislation in regard to the taking of oysters, etc., in the Potomac and Pocomoke rivers. The Governor requested the Virginia Legislature to act on this matter as soon as convenient.

LEGISLATURE.

The Maryland Legislature reassembled last night. Senator Gortner may introduce an amendment to article 15 of the Declaration of Rights. Mr. Smith, of Dorchester, has a general oyster bill that he will introduce in the House. The report of Adjutant-General Howard will

soon be ready for submission. The committee on corporations will hear delegations from Baltimore for and against the electric railway's elevated structure on North street. It is said there will be opposition to the bill converting one of the tobacco warehouses into an elevator for the storage of grain.

A CARD.

At a largely attended meeting held at the store of E. N. Mattingly, Brittan's Neck, February 5th, for the purpose of endorsing a deserving man for the position of Tobacco Inspector, Mr. Robt. Drury was chosen president, E. N. Mattingly, vice-president, Charles H. Lucas, secretary, the following was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That Capt. James T. M. Raley, who formerly held the position, and who elicited it with such credit to the Tobacco Growers and Farmers and proved himself to be thoroughly qualified in discharging the same, is the unanimous choice of this meeting and that we earnestly ask his appointment, and that the secretary be instructed to forward a copy of these resolutions to the Governor R. DRURY, Pres. C. H. LUCAS, Sec. E. N. MATTINGLY, V. Pres.

A numerous meeting of tobacco growers and others interested in the forthcoming appointment of Tobacco Inspectors, being called together at Oakville, 6th District of St. Mary's County on the 1st of February 1892, it was moved and carried that Benedict Thompson be made Chairman and B. F. Knight was selected to act as secretary.

On motion the following resolutions were unanimously adopted, expressive of the sense of the meeting.

Resolved, that as tobacco planters, irrespective of party allegiance, and being deeply interested in the appointment by the Executive of the State of a competent and first class man to the position of State Tobacco Inspector from this county and being informed that Mr. J. T. M. Raley, a well and widely known citizen is an applicant for said position. We hereby most cordially endorse the contest he is making for the place on account of his past experience in that capacity and the universal satisfaction he gave to all concerned as a public official and resolved further that it is the sentiment of this meeting to use all honorable means with the Governor to secure his appointment.

Resolved, that the St. Mary's BEACON be requested to publish these proceedings.
