

GORMAN FOR PRESIDENT.

If we read aught the signs of the times, the boom of Senator Arthur P. Gorman, of Maryland, for the Democratic Presidential nomination is on the increase and his show to be chosen as the Democratic standard-bearer in the coming contest is growing brighter and brighter. We believe Mr. Gorman to be worthy of the high honor. He has been tried in high positions and has never been found wanting; his capacity is known of all men, and there is no taint of megalomania on his Democracy.

There are, of course, other great aspirants for the Democratic nomination but none of them appeal so strongly to the hearts of Democratic veterans as does Senator Gorman. His achievements in the Senate are of too recent date to need comment. Democrats all over the Union know and appreciate them. As a Maryland man he is entitled to the support of Marylanders. If there be a show, and we believe there is, for our State to obtain for one of its sons the honorable distinction of a Presidential nomination, we hope our delegation to the Convention will be in a position to profit by it. We want a candidate to win. We think Mr. Gorman can. We admire Mr. Cleveland. We believe in his greatness, but doubt his availability. And if, as seems probable, the Convention should share the doubt Mr. Gorman's chance for success would be excellent. We hope Maryland will send an unpledged delegation to Chicago, but one which will spare no effort to secure Mr. Gorman's nomination if there be any show for him.

From The Baltimore Sun. TOWNSEND TANGLED IN HIS STATEMENTS.—"Gath," or otherwise "Mr. George Alfred Townsend," has one of his screeds in the New York Sun, in which he characteristically refers to this city, with errors of fact, opinion and judgment, to wit: He names "Robert Winter Davis" as a gallant intellect, but not above letting the native American element "set forth," says, "No man has been produced but Gorman for thirty years, who has been blessed because he was a friend of Lincoln," and that "in 1834 Reverdy Johnson's house was burnt," etc.

Now, as Davis was named "Henry," not "Robert," and Gorman's love for Lincoln is another queer historical revelation, and as Reverdy Johnson's house was not burnt in '34, or in any other year, "Gath" should not be surprised if his usual inaccuracy, as well as his flighty judgment, lacks the confidence and respect of the people of Maryland, even when he interviews a Senator and writes it out for publication.

A MARYLANDER. NEWS IN BRIEF. From the Baltimore Sun. Saturday, April 30. The Naval Academy practice vessel Bancroft will be launched at Elizabethport to-day. The special election upon removal of the Charles county courthouse, May 7, will not be held under the Australian law.

The result of the New York Republican Convention is generally regarded by Congressmen as a decided set-back for President Harrison. The steamship Avona cleared with the largest cargo ever sent from Baltimore, namely, 160,286 bushels of corn.

Four of the colored fellows who were put in Chestertown jail on suspicion of having murdered Dr. Hill, of Millington, Kent county, were brought to Baltimore Friday and put in the city jail, as it was thought they would be lynched if they were kept at Chestertown. Confessions of two of the prisoners show that the right persons were arrested.

Monday, May 2. It is announced that Miss Ruth Burnett, after whom Baby Ruth Cleveland was named, will enter a convent. Judge Roberts rendered a decision Saturday adverse to the new license law for Carroll county.

The editors of the Cumberland Times and Loanoaning Star have been indicted for criminal libel. The Democratic State central committee will meet in Baltimore

on Wednesday and the Republican State Convention in Frederick on the same day. There is an amendment pending in the U. S. House, which will probably be adopted, which will effectually stop any such future application of the contingent fund as that in the Italian indemnity case.

The emigration of Prussian Poles to the United States is rapidly growing heavier. This augmentation is attributed not only to the agricultural depression, but to the general fear that war between Prussia and Russia is inevitable sooner or later.

More than 120,000 signatures of staunch Democrats have been obtained to the roll in favor of the May convention in New York, and it is expected that by the time the convention meets the list will foot up 200,000 names. The local leaders are said to be considering a jump to Cleveland.

Tuesday, May 3. The Governor will make no more appointments until the fall.

The Clerk of the Court of Appeals has appointed as deputy A. W. Neale, of Charles county, vice J. P. Biays.

The United States government has set on foot proceedings in the District Court of Philadelphia to break the recent deal of the Sugar Trust.

Frederick Bailey Deeming, the supposed "Jack the Ripper," was found guilty of the murder of his second wife, in Melbourne, Australia.

About 400 union carpenters of Baltimore struck for the eight-hour workday, and the Master Builders' Association decided to make a stand for the nine-hour day.

It is said to be proposed to elect thirty-two delegates to Chicago, each with half a vote. Gov. Jackson's friends say he is not a candidate for delegate at large, but if elected he will accept.

In the United States Senate Mr. Vest made some pointed remarks about World's Fair expenditures, which he regarded as reckless. A number of bills were taken from the calendar and passed.

The House passed a bill to pension survivors of the Black Hawk, Cherokee, Creek and Seminole wars. The House suspended the rules and passed the free binding twine bill by a vote of 183 to 47. The House also passed a bill admitting to registry foreign-built vessels of not less than 8,000 tons.

[COMMUNICATED. BALTIMORE, Md.—Messrs. Editors.—I read some weeks ago the admirable article of your correspondent T. on the presidential outlook and fully agree with all he says in praise of Mr. Cleveland and his great services to his country; but have grave doubts as to his availability under existing circumstances. As T. truly says: "it is useless to attempt to disguise the fact that the bright prospects of democratic success in the presidential election to come off this fall have been materially clouded by recent events." Those events, to my mind, develop the fact of a very strong opposition to Mr. Cleveland in his own State, an opposition so strong as to make democratic success in that State extremely doubtful, in case of his nomination. With New York against us, I think the most sanguine must admit that our prospects would be anything but encouraging. In this state of the case, I think it is the duty of all democrats who wish their party success to try to send to the Chicago convention gentlemen who will favor the nomination of the strongest candidate possible, be he who he may. If the Democratic party would be true to its traditions and redeem its pledges to the people, it must first get possession of the government, before it can hope to lift from their shoulders the enormous burdens of thirty years of Republican misrule. To find the best man for this purpose should be the solemn duty of the Chicago convention; and to nominate him when found will be the noblest service they can do their country. If we may believe the reports of the press, many of the leading democrats of the country are turning their eyes towards our own distinguished statesman, Senator Arthur Pue Gorman as probably the strongest and best equipped candidate the convention could name. They know of his great strength and popularity with both factions in the "Empire State." With him as our standard bearer, the 36 electoral votes would be sure, as well as those of all the democratic states of the West and South where he is the idol of all who love constitutional government, which he has done so much to uphold. He has a conservative record on all national issues that would make him acceptable to all sections, and his great achievements in politics and statesmanship are known to the utmost confines of the great country he has served so well. The duty of Maryland democrats, I think, is plain. They should send a delegation to Chicago favorable to his nomination. No democrat should be afraid that Mr. Gorman will not cast the vote of the State for whomsoever may be found to be the strongest man, and will do as much as any one to elect him afterwards. Maryland in honoring him will honor herself. Then let us send a Gorman delegation and trust to his great leadership for the
