Mr. Chesley, Captain Jesse Turner and Mr. Harry Harrison, who awarded the 1st prize to Edgar Hurst, of Baltimore; second, to Marshall Garner, of St. Mary's county; third, to Stewart Sansbury, of Baltimore.

On the evening of the same date, the Rev. Dr. Grammer, of Baltimore, delivered the Baccalaureate Sermon to the Graduating Class. Although the weather was very threatening, a large and delightful audience listened to the eloquent divine's earnest words of Godspeed and encouragement to the students, his remarks being applauded to the echo. The most Reverend Doctor's learning was equalled only by his wit.

Tuesday, June 28, at 8 p. m., the Washington & Stone Hill Society entertained their friends with a musical and literary programme. The question, "Should the World's Fair be Opened on Sunday?" was discussed earnestly and intelligently by G. A. Maddox for the affirmative, and Harris Mallinckrodt for the negative.

Wednesday, June 29, at 10 a. m., the Public Examinations were held. Three classes were examined, viz: 1st form Arithmetic; 2nd form Grammar; 3rd form Latin. No exercises occupied the evening of this date, for everybody and everything was getting in trim for the next day, Exhibition Day.

Thursday, June 30, the final day, dawned beautifully; and, from an early hour, the spectators began pouring in, until by half-past ten, the hour for opening the exercises, the commodious school hall was packed to overflowing. The programme was enjoyed thoroughly by the large audience, and was a highly creditable one to this old and valued institution which has just completed its 119th year.

Col. John F. Dent, President of the Board of Trustees, delivered the diplomas, certificates, medals and premiums to the successful students, after which Dr. P. W. Hawkins, of Charles county, addressed the graduates in a speech full of encouragement and good advice. Those receiving diplomas of graduation were: Harris Mallinckrodt and John H. Diggs, of Charles county, and St. Clair Buckler and George Buckler, of St. Mary's county. Certificates were awarded to A. Irving, of New York; James H. Sotheron, St. Mary's county; Frederick Dent and Henry Turner, of Charles county.

In the Department of Mathematics, the gold medal of the 2nd form was awarded to Harris Mallinckrodt, of Charles county; 2nd form, silver medal to D. H. Leake, of Virginia; 1st form, silver medal, to Ed. J. Croker, New York; preparatory medal, to Robert Koss, Washington. In the Department of Classics, 3rd form, premium to Harris Mallinckrodt; 2nd form, to D. H. Leake; 1st form, to G. A. Maddox, Charles county; 1st form, [special] to W. F. Dent, St. Mary's county. For best average in "Civics and Current Events" a gold medal was given to John H. Diggs, Charles county; for spelling, silver medal to Allan Dorsey, of Washington; for Declaration, silver medal to Edward Danenhow, of Washington; Debater's Medal to Harris Mallinckrodt, of Charles county.

The exercises concluded with Skirmish Drill on the campus, Captain R. W. Stillinger in command, after which promotions in the Military Department were announced.
