

NEWS IN BRIEF.

From the Baltimore Sun.

Monday, June 27th, 1892.

The funeral of Judge Goldborough took place in Cambridge Saturday and was largely attended.

A small worm has nearly destroyed the tomato crop on Deal's Island and a protracted drought is doing much injury.

At a Cleveland-Stevenson ratification meeting at Terre Haute, Ind., Friday night, Senator Voorhees said that while Indiana democrats were disappointed that Gray was not on the ticket, yet Indiana would surely cast her electoral vote for Cleveland and Stevenson.

Tuesday, June 28, 1892.

The Italians of Baltimore desire to put up a statue of Columbus.

The first Maryland peaches of the season arrived on the steamer Trumpeter.

On Thursday the board of public works will take up the oyster navy appointments.

New England democratic Congressmen say neither the democratic ticket nor the platform has a weak place in it.

The New Haven News has joined the democratic party.

Max Clerget was shot dead in court yesterday by the brother of a girl he had been accused of assaulting.

Mr. Samuel Boots Edmonston, of St. Louis, is examining records in Prince George's county with a view to establishing a claim to a good portion of the city of Washington.

The President will undoubtedly nominate a Secretary of State during the present week, as the legal limit of thirty days within which the vacancy must be filled will expire Monday next, the 4th prox. The gossip is all at sea regarding this office and seem to have settled on nothing beyond the conclusion that neither Mr. Depew nor Gen. John W. Foster is likely to be appointed.

Wednesday, June 28, 1892.

A shipment of 10,646 bushels of early wheat was received.

Ladies in Chestertown engaged in base-ball yesterday.

On the first of July the State comptroller will make the annual distribution of free school tax to the public schools throughout the State.

The gross receipts for oyster license in Carroll county under the new law is \$6,600.

There is a large number of applications for positions in the oyster navy.

The county tax rate in Montgomery county has been fixed at 90 cents on the \$100.

The members of the bar and other citizens of Wicomico county, are urging the appointment of ex-Gov. Henry Lloyd to the bench. Mr. J. H. White, of the same county, is recommended for the commander in the oyster navy.

The Virginia People, a third-party paper, published at Charlottesville, has suspended publication, and the editor announces his purpose to vote for Cleveland and Stevenson.

L. C. Hook, captain of the sloop Louisa Whyte, wants to be reappointed. Thomas Bowen, Thomas Sewell, George S. Long, R. H. Magill, John R. Garner and George T. Cusick are equally anxious for the place. The appointment comes from St. Mary's, Charles and Calvert counties.

Thomas H. Ching, of the sloop Katie Hines, is tired of the navy, and recommends J. W. Norris as his successor. J. T. Wall, W. J. Frere, R. M. Swann, John C. Peacock, Thomas Pembroke, T. S. Higden and John T. Herbert are also spoken of for the place.

Senator John McCarty, one of Brooklyn's big four, is offering a suit of clothes to anyone who can get him a \$5,000 bet on Cleveland's election. He says Cleveland will carry New York by 30,000. He is supported in this opinion by the democratic organ of Brooklyn.

State Senator Langdon, of Indiana, in New York, says that his State is solid against Harrison, and the battle-ground is in the Northwest.

Thursday, June 30, 1892.

The democratic campaign in Maryland will be opened in September.

The county tax rate for Wicomico has been fixed at 82 1/2 cents on \$100.

Wm. J. Armiger and Charles A. Plaggs sued the city of Baltimore for \$5,000 damages for the alleged destruction of two houses during Monday's storm.

A company has been formed in Crisfield for the manufacture of ice. The rate of county taxation in Harford is filed this year at \$1.03 on \$100.

The President nominated Hon. John W. Foster for Secretary of State, and the Senate promptly confirmed the nomination. Mr. Foster at once entered on the discharge of his duties.

The legislative committees of Maryland and Virginia to procure concurrent action on the fisheries will meet at Old Point, July 14.

Senator Gibson, of Maryland, says he is very well pleased with the nomination of Cleveland and Stevenson, and that it is now the duty of every democrat to give the ticket his hearty support.

Mr. and Mrs. St. Cloud, who recently registered at the Carrollton Hotel, Baltimore, giving New York as their place of residence, were found dead in their room yesterday. Death was caused by poison.

HOW GREEN CAME TO BE CHOSEN.—The early Celts worshipped the dawn and the sunrise. It is more than probable, therefore, that their liking for the color green, which we see in their flags, sashes, etc., arose from a mistake among those who had lost a thorough knowledge of the Irish language. The sun, in Celtic, is called by a word pronounced exactly like our word 'green' and it is likely that the Irish fondness for that color arose through the striking similarity of the two words. In the same way, when we talk about a greenhouse we think they are so called because plants are kept green in them during the winter; yet it is far more probable that the word is derived from the old Celtic word for sun, because greenhouses are so built as to catch the rays and heat of the sun and store them for future use.
