DEATH OF MRS. HARRIET J. MATTHEWS. Mrs. Harriet J. Matthews died on Tuesday morning at the residence of her son-in-law, Mr. A. W. Neale, near Bel Air, the immediate cause of death being heart failure. Mrs. Matthews has been in feeble health for some time though lately her condition has been considered more favorable and her death was not looked for at the time. The deceased was the widow of the late Dr. Thomas Matthews, of St. Mary's county, who died some years ago, since which time she has lived with her daughter, Mrs. Luke F. Matthews and Mr. Joseph S. Matthews, of St. Mary's county, are her sons and Mrs. A. W. Neale is her daughter.

BARBERS CASE. (Reported for the Beacon.) There was a large crowd at the Clifton Factory, Saturday last, to hear the cases of the State against David Bennett, Henry Bennett, and Luther Forrest, all colored, charged with breaking into the storehouse of W. Oliver Turner. After hearing the testimony, the Justice, R. T. Hammett, Esq., held the parties to await the action of the Grand Jury, in the sum of \$100 each, which was given by the parties after a considerable time. The efficient manner in which officers Hammett and James A. Watts worked up this case deserves special commendation.

STATE'S ATTORNEY CAMMELLER WAS PRESENT and conducted the examination on the part of the State, and Justice Charles A. Watts being requested by the prisoners to look after their interest, the State's Attorney and Justice accorded him the privilege, and afforded every opportunity to clear away the strong evidence against them.
