NOTICE is hereby given in conformity with the Constitution and Laws of the State of Maryland, to the Judges of Election and to the qualified voters of St. Mary's county, that an election will be held in said county on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November, it being the 8th day of NOVEMBER, 1892, in the several election districts of said county as follows:

For the purpose of electing One Representative to represent the Fifth Congressional District of Maryland in the Congress of the United States. And also Eight Electors of President and Vice President of the United States. The polls for said election will be opened in each and every election district of said county, at the usual places of holding the polls, at 8 o'clock, a. m., and will close at 6 o'clock, p. m., when the ballots shall be opened and publicly counted.

NOTICE. To Hotel Keepers and all Others Dealing in Liquor. FOR the information of all persons concerned, the following act of the Legislature, passed March 24th, 1893, is published: [CHAPTER 191.] AN ACT prohibiting the sale of spirituous or fermented liquors in the several counties of the State on the day of election.

THE attention of persons who are always in the habit of enforcing their opinions by proposing to bet, is called to the following section of Article 33 of the Code of Public Laws of this State: "46. No person shall make any bet or wager on the result of any election to take place in this State. "47. Any person offending against the preceding section shall be liable to indictment in the Circuit Courts, if the offense be committed in any county, or in the Criminal Court of Baltimore, and on conviction shall be fined not less than fifty dollars, nor more than one hundred dollars for each and every offense, one-half the fine shall be paid to the informer, the other half to the county Commissioners, for the use of the public roads.
