The election returns of the State have been received and tabulated at the Executive office. Cleveland's plurality was 21,130.

The indications are that the coming inauguration of Mr. Cleveland will bring the largest crowd to Washington the country has ever witnessed.

President-elect Cleveland was one of the speakers at the annual dinner of the New York Chamber of Commerce, which was held last night at Delmonico's.

Cardinal Gibbons and other prelates arrived in New York for the Council, which will begin to-day. This evening the Catholic Club will give them a reception.

The Wailes mandamus case was argued in the Court of Appeals by Governor Whyte and Colonel Marshall for the appellant Wailes and by the Attorney-General for the State.

Mr. Enoch Fithian, the oldest man in New Jersey, died at his home in Greenwich, yesterday, aged one hundred years, seven months and five days. He voted last Tuesday for Harrison.

A. M. Swarthout, a farmer whose home was near Lyndon, Ill., was shot and killed and his body was burned in a straw stack. The two sons of the murdered man, John and Ernest Swarthout, have been arrested and charged with the killing. They deny that they committed the crime.
