NEWS IN BRIEF.

From the Baltimore Sun.

Wednesday, May 10, 1893.

The Court of Appeals of Maryland has adjourned till June 20.

Judge Lochren, the new commissioner of pensions, took formal charge of his office yesterday.

Bremen has declared a quarantine against French ports because of the prevalence of cholera.

The Maryland National Guard has been invited to attend the reinterment of Jefferson Davis.

There was white frost at Towson and vicinity, May 9, instant. No damage was done to vegetation.

Owing to the serious condition of affairs existing in Nicaragua the U. S. government has sent the cruiser Atlanta to Greytown.

The death-warrants of Pinkney and Barber were read to the prisoners in Prince George's county, jail, and the reward offered for their apprehension has been distributed.

Unless the President interferes it is probable there will be a clean sweep of republican office-holders in the Treasury Department who are not protected by civil-service rules.

The famine in Central and South-eastern Russia has been followed by a fever which is decimating the population. Great suffering prevails. In Tobolsk the cholera is increasing so rapidly that a corps of medical students has been sent from St. Petersburg to assist the physicians.

Thursday, May 11, 1893.

An actor in an Austrian theatre committed suicide on the stage.

Nearly eight years ago President Cleveland issued an order similar to his recent one shutting the White House door to office-seekers.

A new counterfeit \$5 United States silver certificate, with the portrait of General Grant poorly engraved, is in circulation.

It is understood Secretary Carlisle will recommend for collector of internal revenue for the Maryland district whoever is endorsed by Senator Gorman.

Willis D. Brannock, of Dorchester, was appointed to command the State sloop Julia Hamilton, vice Captain Frazier. The other State fishery force appointments were deferred till May 25.

J. J. Jackson and his wife and two sons and a daughter perished in a fire which burned their house and nearly all other buildings in the village of North Galveston, Ind., on Tuesday. The total property loss is \$75,000.

Mrs. Thomas Roach died in Dover, N. H., aged one hundred and five years and three months. She was born in Newmarket, county Cork, Ireland. She came to this country twenty-five years ago and has since lived with her daughter.

THE COSMOPOLITAN.—A New York paper, taking up the idea conveyed in Flammarion's exciting novel, "Omega: The Last Days of the World," has interviewed a number of the leading men in all professions as to what they would do if science were to predict tomorrow that the end of the world would arrive within the next thirty days.

The answers are various and curious, and heighten the interest which is felt in the second part of Flammarion's great novel, which appears in the May Cosmopolitan. It is a question which everyone will find interesting to ask of himself: What would you do if within six weeks the end of the world were certain? Probably no novel which has ever appeared in an American magazine has been more elaborately illustrated by more distinguished artists. Laurens, Sautier, Vogel, Meaulle, Rochegrosse, Geradin and Chovin all contribute to the explanation of the text.

A clever story of another kind is that of the new English novelist, Gilbert Parker, in the same number. "American Society in Paris" is an article of another kind, but one which will interest all who have had occasion to make even a short residence in the French capital. The Cosmopolitan scores a success in producing in its May number, almost simultaneously with the daily papers, an elaborate description of Professor Gray's marvellous invention, the Telautograph, which reproduces the handwriting, or the work of the artist, simultaneously, thousands of miles distant from the place where the writer or artist is sitting.
