Report of the Leaf Tobacco Association.
The Board of Directors of the Leaf Tobacco Association of Baltimore City have made the following report to the Association:

To the Members of the Leaf Tobacco Association of Baltimore City, GENTLEMEN:—In presenting a review of the trade of the Leaf Tobacco in this market for the past year, we find ourselves again in the pleasant position of recording an active market, and prompt sales of all offerings at firm to advancing prices, so that the financial returns to the farmers, with whose welfare the whole tobacco trade is vitally interested, have continued satisfactory.

The Maryland crop of 1891 was the smallest on record, except the crop failure of 1889, receipts consisting of but 22,455 Hhds. From this quantity and the 5,919 Hhds. Maryland remaining in Warehouse on January 1, 1892, all the consumptive demand of Europe, accustomed to an annual supply of about 20,000 Hhds. had to be filled.

France contracted for about 12,500 Hhd.—the largest quantity she has taken since 1884,—amounting to more than one half of the crop, and the efforts of the contractors to secure this unusually large proportion of the receipts caused at once a very strong feeling in the market, and prices for common and medium grades, which were comparatively scarce, advanced to a higher point than had been known since 1875, very little that was sound selling below 5c. On the other hand, the supply of good to fine grades, which were ripe, fairly colored, and of excellent quality, was largely in excess of the demand, so that prices for such were somewhat lower than during the preceding year, although still fairly maintained. The average obtained for the whole crop was over 7c, thus giving farmers a good remuneration for their labor. The year closes with a stock of but 3,382 Hhds. in Warehouse and 63 Hhds. in seller's hands.

The crop raised in 1892, of which about 1600 Hhds. have thus far come to market, is again a small one; farmers, encouraged by the more favorable results of the two previous years, had made preparations to plant a large crop, but unfavorable seasons for the plant beds, and severe drought during the summer, not only reduced the quantity made to about that of 1891, but also produced much late, and consequently green, tobacco.

The Ohio crop of 1891 was about 6000 Hhds. of fair quality and contained a good proportion of bright color; France contracted for 1500 Hhds., and the other regular consumers took their customary quantity, so that the market was strong during the entire year, and at the close only 203 Hhds., remained in factors' hands, and only 1353 in Warehouse.

The crop which will come to market this year is estimated at 7000 Hhds. of more body and less color than the previous one. During this year Canton Inspection Warehouse retired from business, and the stock of 135 Hhds. Ohio was transferred to Locust Point, thus concentrating almost the entire inspection of Ohio Tobacco at the latter Warehouse.

In December and January last, Governor Brown, in accordance with the power conferred upon him by the last Legislature, leased for a term of four years State Tobacco Warehouses Nos. 2 and 4, and also the old Sugar Warehouse in the rear of Warehouse No. 1, formerly also used for tobacco inspection. He announces that he will use part of the revenue thus derived to make improvements in the three Warehouses still reserved to the trade, by providing elevators, &c. to facilitate the rapid storing and delivery of the tobacco.

Every effort was made by this Association to prevent this diversion of the Warehouses from their legitimate use; several committees waited upon the Governor to present our most energetic protest, and finally we published in the daily papers an open letter to him, repeating our objections and protests—but all in vain. The Warehouses are now forever lost to the tobacco planters of Maryland, by whom they were built, unless a most determined effort is made at the next session of the Legislature to repeal this iniquitous bill, conferring such unlimited and unprecedented power upon the Governor.

At the request of John M. Estes, Esq., Special Agent for the U. S. Government, George L. McCahan, Esq., Commissioner for Columbia Exhibits of the State of Maryland, and Capt. Sylvester, President of the Maryland Agricultural College, this Association had three sets of types of Maryland tobacco prepared,

one each for the Government, State and College Exhibits at the Columbian Exposition; these have been forwarded to Chicago with a descriptive circular, giving average size of crop, and approximate market value of the 25 types selected, and showing the work as done by authority of this Association.

Reclamations this year were the smallest on record, with the exception of 1890, when only 44,000 hhd. came to market.

NEWS IN BRIEF.

From the Baltimore Sun.

Friday, May 19, 1893.

Harris Blank and Isaac Rosenwig were hanged at Funchanock, Pa., for the murder of Jacob Marks.

There were sixteen successful candidates out of forty-four applicants for admission as cadets into the Naval Academy at Annapolis.

Edward Hughes was arrested at his home in Minersville, Pa., yesterday, charged with the murder of his wife.

Mr. John Campbell White, Jr., was thrown from his horse and killed in Howard county.

Pinkney, the condemned murderer in Prince George's county, makes some conflicting statements about the killing of Mr. Bowie.

The net receipts from the late Confederate memorial bazaar in Richmond were \$28,418, of which \$1,446 was realized at the Maryland table.

Saturday, May 20, 1893.

Sunday fishing in New Jersey is prohibited by law.

The fair grounds at Marlboro, Prince George's county, are being rapidly improved with suitable buildings.

Building is very active in several of the new towns of Anne Arundel county.

During the ten months ended April 30, 334,825 immigrants arrived at the ports of the United States.

It is probable ex-Representative Frank T. Shaw will be appointed internal revenue collector for the Maryland district.

William T. Walker, a Washington merchant, obtained a verdict for \$2,133 damages against the Baltimore and Potomac Railroad for injuring his business.

At Gauley Bridge, W. Va., Capt. Wm. Shepherd shot and killed P. Mitchell. Shepherd also received a wound which will probably prove fatal.

Mrs. Laura F. Kemper sues the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad for \$20,000 damages for the death of her husband on the company's tracks in Carroll county.

Wm. J. Burke, charged with murdering his mother a month ago, was convicted at Rockford, Ill. The sentence was fixed at imprisonment for life.

The political campaign has been opened in Harford county with all the present legislative delegates, including Speaker Vandiver, and the Senator in the field for renomination.

The mother of George Harre, who died suddenly a few days ago at Lansing, Mich., has confessed to having poisoned him to prevent his growing up to be a thief. Mrs. Harre, it is believed, is insane. She has been placed under arrest.

C. S. Rogers, president of the Northwestern Cordage Company, one of the largest concerns of St. Paul, Minn., committed suicide yesterday by jumping from the high bridge in that city into the river, 125 feet below.

Monday, May 22, 1893.

A jury in Washington gave Mrs. Fannie Ragland a verdict of \$15,000 against Woodward & Lothrop, proprietors of the Boston Dry Goods Store, in that city, in her suit for damages for being searched by a private detective in the store on a charge of stealing a napkin ring.

Monday, May 22, 1893.

Walter Sorrell, the colored democratic politician, is dead.

On June 1 Admiral Gherardi will assume charge of the New York navy yard.

The British bark Lord Templeton lost nine men and had seven injured in a hurricane.

Carl F. Bankard, eleven years old, was thrown from a horse and killed in Baltimore county.

Seven candidates passed the necessary examination and were admitted Saturday as cadets into the Naval Academy at Annapolis.

Princess Eulalie called upon the President at the White House Saturday morning. Yesterday she went to Mass at St. Matthew's Church, Washington.

Attorney-General Olney received a query from a man in Junction City, Iowa, who wanted to know if the government pays a bounty on twins. If it does, he says, he is the father of three pairs.

Eighteen persons were burned to death in a Michigan forest fire. The property loss was not very great.

The fairest portion of the town of Saginaw, Michigan, was burned, May 21. One life and \$1,600,000 were lost.

A monument has been erected to the memory of Alexander H. Stephens, at Crawfordsville, Georgia. Mr. Stephens was Vice-President of the Southern Confederacy and as a student of American history and a profound constitutional lawyer has had few equals.

Tuesday, May 23, 1893.

George W. Slagle, an enthusiast on religion, committed suicide in Frederick county.

Mrs. Anna Ross, aged one-hundred and two years, died Sunday in Elmira, N. Y.

The steamer Eastern Shore was struck by lightning in Chesapeake bay Sunday evening, but no serious damage was done.

Information received by the marine hospital authorities indicate that slight probabilities of a general outbreak of cholera in Europe.

Republicans held in Treasury Department offices on the recommendations of democratic Congressmen have been charged to the latter as original appointments.

The C. M. Crum Livery Company's building in St. Louis, Mo., was burned Sunday night. One hundred and fifty horses, and Eddie Quinn, son of James Quinn, the foreman, perished in the flames.

A barn belonging to J. H. Wellsworth, near Collington, Prince George's county, was destroyed by lightning. A dwelling-house was struck in Cecil county.

Sheep-picking dogs have become a pest in Kent county.

At Alexandria, Jefferson Phillips, who killed George S. Smith, was sentenced by Judge Norton to eight years in the penitentiary, the motion for a new trial having been overruled.
