Is it Right?

Facts About Witnesses.

It may not be generally known, says the Centreville Observer, still it is a fact nevertheless, that by the "Rules of Court," not only in this county and circuit, but throughout the State, that witnesses summoned to testify for the defendant in cases where the State of Maryland is the plaintiff are not allowed certificates for their attendance payable by the county, unless the defendant is acquitted. Should the defendant be adjudged guilty his witnesses must look to him for the attendance fee, also the statute law prescribes the limit as 30 days from the date of the trial within which a witness must come forward and swear to the number of days he has been in attendance, otherwise the clerk of the court will not tax this as a part of the costs, for the reason he is not authorized to do so under the law unless the witness proves it within said thirty days...

Death of Thomas A. Lynch.

Dr. Thomas Alexander Lynch died at his home in the Second Election District Friday, May 19, 1893, in the 68th year of his age. For many years Dr. Lynch was a prominent figure in St. Mary's affairs and took an active part in all the stirring incidents of the war-time generation. In later years his health would not permit him to take his former interest in county politics, but he continued in the active practice of his profession up to a short time before his death. Paralysis is said to have been the cause of death. The stroke which terminated Dr. Lynch's life came Wednesday of last week, and he remained unconscious until Friday, when death ensued. In 1876, Dr. Lynch was the Democratic candidate for the State Senate, and was returned as defeated by Capt. Asa A. Lawrence by a plurality of five votes. A recount of the ballots cast gave the election to Dr. Lynch by a plurality of 4, but the Senate gave the seat to Capt. Lawrence on the ground that the return judge of one district had permitted the ballots to pass from his possession before they had been turned over to their proper custodian, the Clerk of the Circuit Court.

On Friday an old negro man in Wilson, N. C., eighty years old, (some say he was one hundred), Frank Phillips by name, committed suicide by deliberately shooting the top of his head off.

William Mackessy, the third mar, tried on the charge of conspiracy to murder Geo. E. Rudolph, the ex-Roman Catholic priest, at Lafayette, Ind., was found guilty and his punishment fixed at two years' imprisonment.

Maudie Roberts, the eight-year daughter of H. L. Roberts, of Naugahock, Conn., was standing in front of a store when her clothing caught fire. She rushed upstairs and sought the protection of Mary Monroe, an aged woman, of Waterbury, who was in bed. The bed was set on fire and both were burned to death.

What is claimed to be the oldest church existing in the United States is situated in Smithfield, Va. It was built in the reign of Charles I, between the years 1630 and 1635, the brick, lime and timber being imported from England. The timber is English oak, and was framed in England. It is a brick structure, erected in the most substantial manner.

Peru to Have a Revolution.—Peru is to have a revolution on its hands, it seems, the cause being dissatisfaction with Senator Caceres, the "official" candidate for the presidency. An influential section of the population asks the Senator not to be a candidate, but he refuses to withdraw. On the contrary, he proposes to make a "demonstration" in Lima, and this will, it is feared, lead to hostilities. Like President Pena, of Argentina, he is too "patriotic" to refuse the presidency or a chance at it.
