Our Charles county friends have held their primaries and if reports be true, brother Cox, of the Port Tobacco Times has been worsted, the followers of Circuit Court Clerk Turner carrying five out of the nine districts. The fight is said to have been an animated one, but we hope no differences have been engendered which will divide and weaken the party in our sister county at the coming election.

A special from Washington, to the Baltimore News, on Thursday of last week, says the slate that will be presented to the President for the principal Maryland appointments will be: For Collector Port of Baltimore, Dr. J. Pembroke Thom; for Naval Officer, Hon. Barnes Compton; for Surveyor of the Port, E. Stanley Toadvin, of Wicomico; for U. S. District Attorney, William L. Marbury; for U. S. Marshal, Isaac S. Sanner, the present Sheriff of Baltimore.

Under the requirements of the Constitution Gov. Brown will soon issue a proclamation proposing an amendment to the Constitution as provided by Chap. 313, of the Acts of 1892. The amendment is of special interest to Baltimore City and provides that the General Assembly shall, "as often as it may think the same proper and expedient, provide for the election of an additional judge of the Supreme Bench of Baltimore City," who will be "subject to the same constitutional provisions, hold his office for the same term of years, receive the same compensation and have the same powers" as other judges of the Supreme Bench. The amendment also invests the Legislature with authority to "provide by law or the Supreme Bench by its rules for requiring causes in any of the courts of Baltimore city to be tried before the court without a jury, unless the litigants or some one of them, shall within such reasonable time or times, as may be prescribed, elect to have their causes tried before a jury."

NEWS IN BRIEF.

Friday, July 14, 1893.

It is said Baltimore county republicans may test the law fixing the terms of county commissioners.

Over one hundred thousand less pension certificates have been issued for the fiscal year 1893 than were issued the fiscal year 1892.

A Southerner in New York, speaking of turning emigration to the South, says that it can never be accomplished without organized effort to offer some substantial inducements.

Treasury Department officials interpret the silver-purchase clause in the Sherman law as compelling them to buy silver only when it is offered at the market price.

Saturday, July 15, 1893.

Matilda Louisa, colored, on being released from the Baltimore county jail, insisted upon remaining.

The British brig Darpa, from Havana, infected with yellow fever, has been sent to the quarantine station at Fisherman's Island, mouth of Chesapeake bay.

There was a violent storm in Hagerstown, Middletown and other parts of Washington and Frederick counties yesterday evening.

The travel to Europe this summer is only 55 per cent. of the usual volume, while in the western steamship travel there is an increase of 30 per cent.

Alfred Wilson, who was committed to jail Tuesday at Fitchburg, Mass., being unable to pay a fine of \$5 for drunkenness, was informed yesterday that he had inherited \$50,000 by the death of his father, a wealthy resident of Blackstone, Mass. His real name is Dailey.

At a mass-meeting held in Des Moines, Iowa, resolutions demanding the free and unlimited silver coinage were adopted. General Weaver predicted that if the democratic Congress repeals the Sherman law there never will be another democratic Congress elected.

Patrick J. Gallagher and J. M. Danison, who are serving terms in the Western Pennsylvania penitentiary for self-confessed complicity in the alleged poisoning of non-union workmen in the Carnegie mill at Homestead, Pa., have confessed that there was no poisoning, and that their testimony against Hugh F. Dempsey and Robert J. Beatty was false, and that they were paid to swear falsely.

Monday, July 17, 1893. Baltimore will send out the largest

est cargo of hay which has ever been exported from America to Europe. The Oakland postoffice was entered, the safe broken open and \$1,000 in postage-stamps and \$300 in money was taken.

At the democratic primaries in Somerset county Saturday delegates were elected favorable to the nomination of Judge Page.

In the Charles county primaries the La Plata section of the party, headed by Samuel Turner, was successful.

The handsome new Catholic church and several business blocks in Leipsic, Ohio, were blown down and a number of dwellings leveled by a tornado Saturday.

The third case of yellow fever on the British brig Darpa, now at Fisherman's Island quarantine, at the mouth of Chesapeake bay, has been discovered.

Statements of the condition of national banks in the eastern section of the country received by the comptroller of the currency make a better showing than was expected.

By special investigation a division of the bureau of pensions succeeded in two months in saving the government over \$150,000 which would have been allowed as first payments to unworthy pensioners.

Tuesday, July 18, 1893.

Owing to shipments to London the price of silver was higher yesterday.

The steamer Constance arrived at Baltimore from Spain with the largest cargo of iron ore ever brought to the United States.

Arthur Courtney and Henry Taylor, the men accused of the murder of Capt. Frank Cooper, made an unsuccessful attempt to break jail.

The requisition for Capt. John Gaskin on the charge of shooting Revell Sterling in Maryland waters was presented to Governor McKinney, of Virginia.

The State Department at Washington has been informed that Siam has made concessions to France, and that an amicable settlement of the trouble between the two countries is probable.

James Dixon Bartlett died near Easton, having recently returned from Cuba. His physician was of opinion that it was a case of yellow fever, but the State health commissioner declared that it was not.

An expedition under the command of Robert Stein, of the U. S. geological survey, will start from this country early next year to explore the territory to the north of Baffin bay and the west of Smith sound in the arctic region.

The Yale astronomers say the auroral beam which appeared last Saturday night has no connection with the comet.

Tom King, leader of a gang of horse thieves in Oklahoma, has been captured and found to be a woman in disguise.
