The primary fight in the Democratic ranks is now over and there should be no hard feelings as to the result. It was a legitimate difference of opinion as to the choice of candidates and it was honestly fought out. Because a man does not see things in the primaries as you do is no argument that he is not as good a Democrat. Let there now be no complaints or bickerings because of actions in the primary but let the party come together and give the party ticket an honest support. It is the duty of party candidates to faithfully represent the whole party and we believe it will be the earnest endeavor of the ticket nominated to do it.

**THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.**—This is the way the Baltimore County Union, one of the best Republican papers in the State puts it: "The County Republican convention met at Towson town on Monday and nominated a complete county ticket, including County Commissioners. Under the present law the office of Commissioner will not be vacant this fall, but as it is claimed by many that the law under which the present Board holds is unconstitutional, the nominations were made with the hope or expectation that the Court of Appeals will declare the law unconstitutional. But even if it should do so we cannot see how it would ensure to the advantage of those gentlemen who will be voted for in November. It is asserted that the old County Commissioners' law was repealed before the new one was enacted and if this be true it is useless to expect to secure office under it. If the old law was repealed and the new one should be declared unconstitutional then there will be no law providing for County Commissioners and we suppose the Governor would then be called upon to appoint a Board. If this contingency should arise it is quite safe to say that no Republicans would be selected, no matter how many votes they might have received."

## NEWS IN BRIEF.

From the Baltimore Sun.

August, Monday 28, 1893

Galena, in Kent county, is rapidly rebuilding the district burned last spring.

Water was so scarce at a large picnic near Middletown that it was sold by the glass from the refreshment booths.

George G. Reed, who killed his wife and cut his own throat Friday at 907 Prospect lane, died Saturday at Johns Hopkins Hospital.

While playing Gustave Giesler, eight years old, was shot and dangerously wounded by Harry Garrett, a colored boy, who discharged a cat rifle at him.

The first case under the Chinese exclusion act arose in Baltimore by the arrest of Charlie Wing, charged with being a laborer who unlawfully returned to the United States.

The speech of Representative W. Bourke Cockran, of New York, in

the House of Representatives, Saturday, in favor of the repeal of the Sherman law is considered a masterpiece of argument and oratory.

The salmon run this year in the Fraser river, B. C., is larger than ever before. Some of the small tributaries are so choked with fish that boats are unable to cross. Last night the run averaged 900 to the boat. Many boats were swamped and one fisherman drowned.

August, Tuesday 29, 1893.

The pension bureau has made arrangements whereby pensioners who draw their money at Baltimore will receive cash.

By a vote of 32 to 29 Lee Mantle, of Montana, and John S. Allen, of Washington, the appointed Senators, were declared not entitled to seats in the Senate.

Advices received by steamer from Labrador at St. John's, N. F., are to the effect that Lieutenant Peary, the explorer, has lost a month of valuable time in fruitless effort to secure dogs.

Mrs. Virginia B. McLean, widow of the late Wilmer McLean, formerly of Alexandria, and at whose house the surrender of General Lee at Appomattox took place, died at Camden, W. Va., on Saturday.

The Wilson bill, repealing the Sherman act passed the House by a majority of 130. Yeas, 240; nays, 110.

The Bland proposition for free coinage at the ratio of 16 to 1 was defeated. Yeas, 124; nays, 226. Majority, 102.

The long drought in Maryland was broken by Monday's storm. The cadet trading-ship Constellation anchored in Annapolis rivers. The Prince George's democrats nominated a county ticket headed by Wm. D. Bowie for the Senate.

The voting in the House of Representatives on silver was promptly sent on the tickets to the Baltimore finance people. The result was greeted with congratulations. The financial and general markets of the country responded to the news with an improved feeling.

The six Representatives from Maryland in the House of Representatives voted on every roll-call against the amendments to the Wilson repeal bill. Most of the gains made in the majorities against the amendments of the silver men to the Wilson repeal bill were among the Southern members.

## Registration Notice.

Notice to the Qualified Voters of the Respective Election Districts of St. Mary's County.

**SEPTEMBER SITTING 1893.**  
THE undersigned Officers of Registration for the several election districts of St. Mary's County hereby give notice that they will attend at the places named below, on

**Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, the 18th, 19th and 20th of September 1893.** (the same being designated in the Act of Assembly as the September Sitting.)

from 8 o'clock, a. m., to 8 o'clock, p. m., of each of the designated days for the purpose of registering the voters of said districts, as prescribed by chapter 573 of the Acts passed by the General Assembly of Maryland, at the January Session of 1890.

It is thought proper to publish in the registered law so far as they are applicable to the counties which bear particularly upon the power and duty of the Registrar and the rights of the citizen:

3. Each of the said officers of registration shall have in addition to the other powers conferred upon him by the law, the power to preserve order and enforce obedience to the laws of the county at or around his place of registration; to keep the access to such place open and unobstructed; to prevent and suppress riots, tumults, disorders or any other disturbance or obstruction of the work of registration; and to protect and keep safe the registries of voters hereinafter referred to while in his custody and possession; he may compel the presence of witnesses before him while sitting as an officer of registration for all purposes connected with the performance of the duties of his office by summons and attachment; he may while sitting as such officer of registration, or for trial any person committing an offense forbidden by this article; he shall have the power to issue any said summons, attachments or commitments when sitting in any county of the State to the Sheriff of said county or to any constable thereof; and such processes shall be served by any respective officers in the same manner as if they were issued by the Judge of a court of record having jurisdiction of the subject matter or by a Justice of the peace exercising police powers within such respective jurisdiction; the sheriff or any constable in any county in this State who shall serve any said processes shall receive the same fees and in like manner as is or may be by law provided for the sheriff or constable in other State cases, but no officer of registration shall charge or receive any compensation for any service performed under this article except such as is provided by this article.

The special attention of citizens leaving the State, temporarily, is called to the following extract from the Acts of 1890, Article 14, Chapter 14: "It is the duty of every citizen of this State, upon the passage of this act all persons who shall vacate and remove from the place of their actual domicile, abode, dwelling place or habitation within this State and shall be deemed to have abandoned such domicile, abode, dwelling place or habitation on this date shall be conclusively presumed to have lost their residence in this State, and shall in consequence thereof be disqualified to vote, unless at or about the time of such removal or within ten days thereafter they shall go in person before the Clerk of the Circuit Court for the county from which they are about to remove, and shall make and acknowledge before him an affidavit declaring that notwithstanding such removal from their domicile, abode, dwelling place or habitation they intend to change their legal residence but they have a fixed and definite purpose to return to this State on or before the day of the next ensuing general election in November, and shall file so to return and take up their actual abode, domicile, dwelling place or habitation in this State on or before six months next preceding such November election, they shall be conclusively presumed to have abandoned such domicile, abode, dwelling place or habitation, and the officers of registration shall refuse to register them as qualified voters, or shall strike off their names from the registry if their names be entered thereon."

## Proclamation by the Governor.

STATE OF MARYLAND, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

WHEREAS, Section one of Article fourteen of the Constitution of Maryland makes it the duty of the Governor to order the publication in certain newspapers to be designated by him of any bill, or bills, passed proposing any amendments to the said Constitution; and

WHEREAS, at the January Session, 1892, of the General Assembly of Maryland, a bill was passed proposing an amendment to the Constitution, which amendment is Chapter 313 of the Acts of 1892, and is as follows, to wit:

**CHAPTER 313.**  
AN ACT to add an additional section to Article four of the Constitution of this State.

**SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, Three-fifths of all the members of the two houses concurring, that the following section be, and the same is hereby proposed to be added to the Constitution of this State; and if adopted by the legal and qualified voters thereof, as herein provided, the same shall supersede within such place the place of Section thirty-nine of Article four of the Constitution.**

**SEC. 2. The General Assembly shall, as often as they may think the same proper and expedient, provide by law for the election of an additional Judge of the Supreme Bench of Baltimore city, and whenever provision is so made by the General Assembly, there shall be elected by the voters of said city another Judge of the Supreme Bench of Baltimore city, who shall be subject to the same constitutional provisions, hold his office for the same term of years, receive the same compensation, and have the same powers as are or shall be provided by the Constitution, or laws of this State, for the Judges of said Supreme Bench of Baltimore city, and the General Assembly may provide by law, or the Supreme Bench by its rules, for requiring causes in any of the courts of Baltimore city to be tried before the Court without a jury, unless the litigants or some of them may be prescribed, elect to have their cases tried before a jury. And the General Assembly may reappoint, change or change the jurisdiction of the several courts in said city.**

**SEC. 3. And be it further enacted, by the authority aforesaid, That the foregoing section hereby proposed as an amendment to the Constitution, shall be, at the next general election to be held in this State, submitted to the legal and qualified voters thereof for their adoption or rejection in pursuance of the direction contained in Article fourteen of the Constitution of this State; and at the said general election the vote on said proposed amendment to the Constitution shall be by ballot, and upon each ballot there shall be written or printed the words "For the Constitutional Amendment," or "Against the Constitutional Amendment," as the voter may elect, and immediately after said election due return shall be made to the Governor of the votes for and against said proposed amendment, as directed by said fourteenth Article of the Constitution.**

Approved, April 4, 1892.

Now, therefore, I, Frank Brown, Governor of Maryland, do hereby order and direct that the said heretofore described bill, or Act of the General Assembly, proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Maryland, be published once a week for at least three months in two newspapers published in each county in this State, if so many are therein published, and in three newspapers in the city of Baltimore, before the next ensuing general election, which will be held on Tuesday, the seventh day of November, 1893; at which said election the proposed amendment aforesaid will be submitted to the legal and qualified voters of Maryland for adoption or rejection.

Given under my hand and the Great Seal of Maryland, at the City of Annapolis, on the 19th day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety three, and of the Independence of the United States, the one hundred and seventeenth.
