The Democratic House of Representatives at Washington did a good day's work when it wiped out, root and branch, the scandalous Federal Election laws which the Republican party had fastened upon the country. It is to be hoped that the Senate will be equally expeditious and that it will speedily pass the Tucker bill sent it by the House.

Unceasing work is the price of political success and no party can hope to win whose adherents do not bestir themselves in its cause. Would you enjoy the fruits of Democratic victory, then go to work and help to win? One good day's work before election counts more than two months of "I-told-you-so" talk after the fight is over.

The Colored Preachers of Baltimore, including all Protestant ministers, at their monthly meeting last Monday passed a series of resolutions denouncing the action of Chas. T. Westcott, Esq., chairman of the recent Republican convention in conspicuously ignoring the colored vote of the city in appointing a Republican central committee. They allege that Mr. Westcott was governed by race prejudice in refusing the colored people representation on the committee and declare that it would be an insult to their manhood should they support the Republican party under such circumstances. A resolution that the colored people of Baltimore vote the prohibition ticket was lost by a large majority.—Record.

The Democrats in the U. S. House of Representatives are hard at work preparing a bill to modify the tariff and so reduce the burdens laid upon the bread-winners of this country. As is right our lawmakers are exercising due care in the preparation of the said bill and are not rushing ahead madly to find out after their work is done that some important detail has been overlooked. Up to date we are living under the laws fastened upon the country by the Republican party. And the present depression and our recent financial embarrassments are the legitimate products of Republican rule. We are yet living under Republican laws. For the first time since President Buchanan's time the Democrats are in entire control of the government. When their laws are formulated and passed we believe a new era of prosperity will dawn upon us. But at present the incubus which rests upon the country is directly chargeable to the misgovernment of the Republican party. The charge that the Democrats are responsible for the present condition of things is the veriest hush and twaddle, emanations of gross ignorance or willful misrepresentations of facts.

NEWS IN BRIEF.

From the Baltimore Sun.

Friday, October 13, 1893.

It is stated there will be filibustering in the Senate on the republican side against the federal elections bill. Some changes have been made by consent in the democratic ticket nominated in Calvert county. A man died in the lunatic asylum at Williamsburg, Va., aged one hundred and eleven years.

In Philadelphia ground was broken for the Bourse, which is to be built on Fifth street, at a cost of \$2,000,000.

No Territories will be admitted into the Union as States during the present session of Congress.

Col. Robert C. Ingersoll, who is in Lexington, Ky., advised the colored people to test the separate railroad coach law.

Peter Pearson, postmaster at Lewiston, S. D., while jealous, shot and killed his wife and then himself on the prairie near that place. They leave six children.

Taylor and Courtney, the colored men who killed Capt. Frank Cooper at Deal's Island last summer, were convicted of murder in the first degree by a jury in Prince Anne Court after being out only nine minutes.

The democratic campaign in Baltimore opened with an immense mass-meeting in City Hall plaza. Speeches were made by Congressmen Allen, of Mississippi, and Caruth, of Kentucky, Mayor Latrobe, ex-Mayor Hodges and Joseph Thompson.

Saturday, October 14, 1893. Pope Leo XIII sent a large photograph of himself to Mayor Latrobe.

George C. Howard has been sentenced in Prince George's county to the penitentiary for forgery.

It is said that as the election approaches law-breaking, as to gambling, &c., is more frequent in New York city.

Eighteen new cases of yellow fever and two deaths were reported at Brunswick, Ga., yesterday.

Nine persons were killed and about thirty injured yesterday in a collision on the Michigan Central Railroad, at Jackson, Mich.

The poultry show at the Hagerstown fair was one of the finest ever held in this country and Maryland fanciers showed up very creditably.

The storm from the South reached Baltimore yesterday, prostrating telegraph wires, delaying railroad traffic and flooding the streets on the water front.

The local laws for Carroll county forcing vagrants to work on streets and roads has had the effect of keeping many tramps out of the reach of the justices of the peace and out of the county jail.

The father of a bride who refused to live with her husband's mother and had returned to her own parents' home sued the husband for the wife's board bill, in Washington, and lost the case.

Senator Voorhees is determined to have nothing to do with any compromise silver bill. He will fight for unconditional repeal until he is either victorious or is defeated on a direct vote on the pending bill.

President Cleveland will not, it is said, sign a bill that threatens in any way to depreciate the currency. Nor will he, under any circumstances, give his approval to a measure that extended the purchase of silver beyond his term of office.

Advocates of repeal have agreed upon a plan to keep the Senate in session each day as late as a quorum can be held in the chamber, with the intention of forcing the silver men to occupy all the time and thereby tire them out.

The American yacht Vigilant won the third race of the series of five for America's cup yesterday off Sandy Hook, N. J., defeating the English yacht Valkyrie forty seconds, correct time. This race wins the match for the American vessel.

The power-house of the Brush Electric Light and Power Company, at Monument and Constitution streets was destroyed by fire. The Baltimore city jail became ignited by flying sparks and was greatly damaged. A number of prisoners in the jail were almost suffocated by smoke and heat and were revived with difficulty.

Monday, October 14, 1893.

Mr. John L. Thomas, ex-Congressman and ex-collector of the port of Baltimore, died on Sunday.

William Powell committed suicide by cutting his throat and stabbing himself in the breast in Somerset county.

Fire, caused by the crossing of electric wires, occurred in Allentown, Pa., Saturday morning. The loss will amount to \$300,000.

Wade N. Williams and William Gilroy, of Charles county, Md., Otho Bussard and an unknown colored man were injured by cable cars in Washington.

Mr. Voorhees announced, for the benefit, he said, of anybody who thinks that the advocates of repeal have surrendered or have it in contemplation, that they have only begun to fight.

Haven F. Winn killed his two-year-old son in Springfield, Mass., yesterday, by cutting his jugular vein with a razor, and then committed suicide in the same way. Family troubles led to the act.

Paul Victor Neuschwanger and Frank Rebsomer, of Switzerland, were killed instantly, and John Hassenfrantz, of the same country, dangerously injured by being struck by a train on the Baltimore and Potomac Railroad, two miles from Washington.

Thirty-four cases of yellow fever were reported yesterday at Brunswick, Ga., and thirty-two on Saturday. Two new cases were reported at Jessup on Saturday. Three deaths occurred at Brunswick. The cool wave is favorable to a decrease in cases, but unfavorable to the patients.

William Dean and William Smith colored prisoners who were removed from the jail to the City Hospital during the fire on Friday night, are dead. To relieve the crowded condition of the jail 240 prisoners held in minor cases have been released by shortening their sentences. The damage to the jail is estimated at \$6,000.

The storm which raged throughout the Atlantic coast States on Friday did great damage to telegraph lines, which were generally prostrated that communication between various parts of the country was cut off. The property damage was not unusually great. On the South Carolina coast nineteen persons were drowned. In the District of Columbia the damage is estimated at \$60,000, while a loss of \$20,000 was suffered in and around Alexandria, Va.

Sixteen vessels are reported wrecked on Lake Michigan in the northwest gale that has been raging since Friday night.

Eighteen lives are reported to have been lost on Lake Erie in the same storm.

Tuesday, October 15, 1893. More German settlers are expected to come to Maryland from Kansas.

The men convicted of the murder of Capt. Frank Cooper were sentenced to death by Judge Lloyd at Princess Anne.

John S. Standiford's house and the hall at Fallston, Harford county, were burned Sunday night.

Ronald Pathe, of Cambridge, while driving with a lady was thrown from his carriage and so badly injured that he died.

Two horses and other animals were burned to death in a fire which destroyed Mr. Henry Mimmier's barn, on the Annapolis road.

The steamer Wocoken, of Cleveland, founded on Lake Erie during the storm of Sunday and thirteen lives were lost.

Mr. Aldrich virtuously gave notice that it would require a cloture rule to pass either the repeal of the federal election laws or the reform of the tariff through the Senate.

Thirty-one new cases of yellow fever were reported at Brunswick, Ga., yesterday and two at Jessup. Three deaths occurred at Brunswick. The weather is chilly.

In the House of Representatives, the bill extending for six months the time within which Chinese may be allowed to register under the operation of the Geary law was passed by a vote of 178 to 1.

The republicans would be delighted to have the Senate abandon the silver bill and let the session end with no result in order that they might call the attention of the country to the inability of the democratic majority to do anything.

The new Congressional Library in Washington will, Librarian Spofford estimates, accommodate all the books of the world for one hundred years to come and still leave seven-eighths of its available space applicable for other purposes.

Capt. W. C. Hale, an old resident of Joliet, Ill., while temporarily insane Sunday, fatally stabbed his wife with a pair of shears, inflicting twenty wounds. He then stabbed himself many times with the same weapon. He will die.

The election so to be held is for the purpose of electing

One person to be Comptroller of the Treasury of the State of Maryland.

One person to represent St. Mary's county in the State Senate.

Two persons to represent St. Mary's county in the House of Delegates.

One person to be Sheriff of St. Mary's county.

One person to be County Commissioner for St. Mary's county.

One person to be County Surveyor for St. Mary's county.

In accordance with the Act of the General Assembly, passed at the session of 1892, a vote will be taken at the same time on one amendment to the Constitution of this State as follows:

An Act to add an additional section to Article four of the Constitution of Maryland.

The proposed amendment is for the purpose of empowering the General Assembly of this State to increase the number of judges of the Supreme Bench of Baltimore city.

The legal form of ballot is: "For the Constitutional Amendment," or "Against the Constitutional Amendment."

The polls will be opened at 8 o'clock A. M., and close at 6 o'clock P. M.

NOTICE.

TO HOTEL KEEPERS AND ALL OTHERS WHO DEAL IN LIQUORS.

For the information of all persons concerned the following sections of Article 33, of the Code of Public General Laws, of the State of Maryland, are published:

AN ACT prohibiting the sale of spirituous or fermented liquors in the several counties of the State on the day of Election.

Section 88. It shall not be lawful for the keeper of any hotel, tavern, store, drinking establishment, or any other place where liquors are sold, or for any person or persons, directly or indirectly to sell, barter, give or dispose of any spirituous or fermented liquors, ale or beer, or intoxicating drinks of any kind, on the day of any election hereafter to be held in the several counties of the State.

Section 89. Any person violating the provisions of the preceding section shall be liable to indictment by the Grand Jury of the county where the offence is committed and shall, upon conviction, before any Judge of the Circuit Court of this State, be fined a sum not less than fifty, nor more than one hundred dollars for each and every offence—one half the fine shall be paid to the informer, the other half to the County Commissioners, for the use of public roads.

Section 90. No person shall make any bet or wager on the result of any election to take place in this State.

Section 91. Any person offending against the last preceding section, shall be liable to indictment in any county, or in the Criminal Court of Baltimore, if the offence be committed in any county, or in the Criminal Court of Baltimore, and on conviction shall be fined not less than fifty nor more than five hundred dollars, to be paid to the State for the use of the school fund.

Section 92. Every deposit of money in any part of the State, as a wager or bet upon elections in this State or elsewhere shall be forfeited and paid over to the County Commissioners of the county where deposited, for the use of the county, and if deposited in the city of Baltimore, to the mayor and city council.
