NEWS IN BRIEF. From the Baltimore Sun.

Saturday, December 9, 1893. Elmer Bush, of Harford county, lost part of his hand in a gunning accident.

George Bunn, an American artist, has been found guilty of murder in Brussels for killing a servant girl.

Representative Compton, of Maryland, who is indisposed, has gone to Atlantic City for the benefit of his health.

Opponents of the sugar bounty hope to have that feature stricken from the tariff bill before the measure is presented in the House.

Burphy, who was shot through the neck at Massey's, in Kent county, is still alive, but there is believed to be slight prospect of his recovery.

Canvass of the members of the ways and means committee shows a preference for March 1 as the date for putting in operation the Wilson tariff bill.

The name of Buchanan Selvey, of Hagerstown, Md., has been presented at the Treasury Department for the position of naval officer at Baltimore.

Jacob Holtzman, aged twenty-eight years, killed his ten-month-old boy and himself at the residence of his mother-in-law, in Pittsburg, Pa., yesterday.

Twelve persons died within a week of the grip at Beaver Falls, Pa. Manufacturers are crippled by the illness of employees, and the attendance at the schools is reduced to one-half.

At the doll's bazaar in Washington little Ruth Cleveland and Postmaster-General Bissell's daughter Margaret had a rough-and-tumble tussle and their mothers sent them home.

The members of the ways and means committee of the House of Representatives have virtually decided to place a tax upon playing cards and proprietary medicines and to increase the tax on cigarettes.

Mrs. G. F. Nichola's two little children, Freddie, aged three years, and Annie, aged two years, were burned to death in Kansas City. She locked them in a room while she went down town.

Lyman Lyons died at his home on Dry Hill, Montague, Mass., on Thursday, in straightened circumstances. He was a brother of General Lyons, who was killed in Missouri during the civil war.

Harney Pate, aged twenty-one years, and Frank Stiers, aged nineteen years, were hanged at Danville, Ill., for the murder of Henry Helmick, a wealthy farmer. Robbery was the object of the crime.

United States Fish Commissioner McDonald has prepared a report on the oyster industry of Maryland.

Captain Moore, of the steamship Queensmore, now at Baltimore, was acquitted at Brickenhead, England, of cruelty to an ox.

The bill to admit Utah into the Union will be called up in the House of Representatives at the morning hour tomorrow.

It is believed the correspondence on the Hawaiian question called for by Mr. Hoar in his resolution will be sent to the Senate this week.

Miss Ethel C. Curtis, nineteen years of age, was struck by the engine of an express train at Takoma Station, on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, and killed instantly.

A bomb was thrown into the French Chamber of Deputies on Saturday while the body was in session and about eighty persons were injured, though no one was killed.

It is reported that President Cleveland has announced he will appoint Judge Charles H. Simontou, of South Carolina, as judge of the fourth judicial circuit, to succeed the late Judge Hugh L. Bond, of Baltimore.

Tuesday, December 12, 1893. The New York Court of Appeals has decided that fishing on Sunday is illegal.

Efforts are being made to organize a cavalry company in Baltimore.

The date in which the new tariff bill will go into effect has been changed from March 1 next to June 1.

John Nolan, a New York court officer, made his will on Saturday while in good health and died on Sunday.

It is said to be settled that the ways and means committee will, in the internal revenue bill, impose a tax on incomes.

The sheriff of Somerset county is making preparations for the execution of the murderers of Captain Cooper next Friday.

Judge James McSherry, of Frederick, declares that the proposed division of the free school funds and the appropriation of a portion of it to Catholic schools would be wrong and unconstitutional.

John Brophy, who was shot last Thursday at Massey's, in Kent county, died. The coroner's jury returned a verdict that he came to his death from a pistol wound inflicted by John J. Spears.

In an affray on the oyster boat Kate Darling, lying in the Wicomico river, Patrick Corcoran was severely and perhaps fatally wounded. James Mitchell and Thomas M. Donohue were arrested, charged with the offense.
