DEMOCRATIC PRIMARIES.

The Democratic voters of St. Mary's county are requested to assemble in their respective districts and at the usual polling places

SATURDAY, September 1st, 1894
and elect ten delegates to meet in county convention at Leonardtown.

MONDAY, September 3rd, 1894.
and select three delegates to represent St. Mary's County in the Congressional Convention to be held at Catonsville, September 5th, proximo. The Congressional Convention is to nominate a candidate for the unexpired term of Hon. Barnes Compton and a candidate for the 54th Congress.

The voters in the several districts will at the opening of the polls appoint three Judges and two Clerks to hold said election. Polls to be opened at 2 o'clock, p. m., and close at 6 o'clock, p. m.

The new tariff bill takes all taxes off wool, lumber, burlaps, hemp, jute, flax, cotton bagging and ties, binding twine, and reduces taxation on cotton, silk and woolen goods.

The average rate of duty of the present (McKinley) law is about 51 per cent. The new law reduces the average to about 38 per cent. The average under the bill as it passed the House was 35 per cent.

NEWS IN BRIEF.

From the Baltimore Sun.

Saturday, August 18, 1894.

The pay of school teachers in Frederick county has been reduced.

It is understood the Baltimore & Ohio agency at Shepherds will be removed to Alexandria.

It is probably Congress will adjourn as soon as the compromise tariff bill already passed becomes a law.

The report of the librarian of the Congressional Library shows the total number of volumes on the shelves to be 695,880.

It is understood the leading democratic members of the Senate finance committee expect to report all the supplemental tariff bills to the Senate, but there seems to be little hope for the passage of any one of them.

Mr. Isidor Rayner's announcement of his candidacy for the gubernatorial nomination has occasioned much discussion among business men and politicians. It is conceded on all sides that Mr. Rayner is well fitted for the place and that he would make a good Governor.

Monday, August 20, 1894.

Governor Brown sent one hundred members of Coxey's army to Ohio yesterday over the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad.

Jacob B. Miller, of Hagerstown, who had an excessive cigarette smoker, cut his throat with a razor and it is thought hardly possible for him to recover.

Captain E. W. Nicholson, superintendent of the Treasury Department stables in Washington, shot himself in the stomach, and died after being removed to the Emergency Hospital.

Full returns from the Alabama State election show that Oates received 109,160 votes and Kobb 82,394. Oates's majority 25,766.

In South Carolina Judge Aldrich decided that the State liquor dispensary law is unconstitutional in its main features.

The resolution of Mr. Murphy declaring that it was the sense of the Senate that no further tariff legislation should be enacted at this session was adopted by a vote of 27 to 16. Messrs. Gorman and Gibson, of Maryland, voting in the affirmative.

FOR CONGRESS.

Messrs. Editors—I am an applicant for the place of Naval Officer in Baltimore in March shortly after the inauguration of Mr. Cleveland. I do not now recollect the name of any other candidate but have reason to believe Mr. Gorman was favorable to a gentleman from his own county. Our representative, Mr. Compton, being anxious to quit Congress became an applicant for the place and thus became my only opponent. He was nominated by the President in April of the present year and served in the Senate early in May last. Col. John F. Dent published after the nomination an account to the voters of this Congressional District strongly recommending me as the candidate for the unexpired term of Mr. Compton. About that time I was seriously ill in health and expecting certainly that the Governor would immediately issue the necessary proclamation in order to hold the election in time to avoid myself of Col. Dent's suggestion and most favorable recommendation I thought it best to give public notice by the Sheriff before giving publicity to my wishes or intentions. In the meantime, however, the Governor announced that he would not issue the proclamation which the law of Maryland required, and that the vacancy caused by Mr. Compton's appointment would not be filled until the regular election in November next. In the meantime I have fully recovered my health and feel able to perform the duties of the position, and will, therefore, allow my name to be presented to the Congressional Convention to be held for this Congressional District on the 5th proximo, and desire that it may be received. I will fill the vacancy in the term caused by Mr. Compton's withdrawal, which will expire on the 4th of next March. I do not wish to be considered a candidate for the next Congress beginning from the 4th of March. I trust that Mr. Dent will accord me favorable consideration.
