How to Treat Ink Spots.—Ink stains are hard to deal with, but much may be accomplished as to their disappearance if they are only treated in time. One good remedy is to tear blotting paper to pieces and hold the rough edges on the ink when it is freshly spilled. If there is no blotting paper at hand cover the spot with Indian meal, or liquid ink may be absorbed by cotton batting. When ink is spilled the first care should be to prevent it from spreading.

Another way of preventing ink stains is to immediately wash the stained article in several waters and then in milk, letting it soak in the milk for several hours. Another manner of removing all ordinary ink stains is to wash the article immediately in vinegar and water, and then in soap and water. No matter what is used for removing ink, the stain must be rubbed well.

NEWS IN BRIEF.

From the Baltimore Sun.

The freshest in the Susquehanna river has left Port Deposit in a badly crippled estate.

Postmaster Abram Claude, of Annapolis, has received his commission and will enter upon his duties in a few days.

Ex-Senator Ransom left for his home in North Carolina. He will depart for Mexico to assume charge of the mission on the 15th inst.

In New York Mrs. Wm. K. Vanderbilt obtained a divorce from her husband, the custody of her children and \$300,000 a year alimony.

A special train has been chartered to leave Memphis on Thursday for Savannah to gather up on the way 500 colored people who have engaged passage to Liberia.

The Bimetallic League has issued an address to the country defining its principles and recommending Representative Sibley, of Pennsylvania, as its candidate for presidency next year.

The light-house system of Maryland and Virginia has been greatly impaired by the refusal of Congress to allow the appropriations asked for the restoration of the Smith's Point light and that at Maryland Point.

Japan has accepted the credentials of China's peace envoy, Viceroy Li Hung Chang, and he started from Peking yesterday on his mission after an interview with the Dowager Empress, in which she warmly approved his course. The Japanese have abandoned Wei-Hai-Wei after destroying the Chinese fortifications.

It has been decided to lay the foundation of the Key monument at Frederick in September next.

Port Deposit is considered out of danger from high water in the Susquehanna, and the damage to property was not so great as at first estimated.

The captain-general of Cuba has demanded the recall of the American consul-general at Havana, and the Spanish cabinet will support the demands.

W. Calvin Chase was found guilty of the charge of libel against C. H. J. Taylor, recorder of deeds of the District. Both parties to the suit are colored.

Gen. Frank A. Bond, of Anne Arundel county, Md., has been appointed sealer of weights and measures for the District at an annual salary of \$2,500. Ridgely B. Bond is his assistant.

Two strangers drove into the town of Adel, Iowa, about twenty miles from Des Moines, yesterday morning and attempted to rob the bank. They shot the cashier and several citizens and escaped, but were overtaken. The leader refused to surrender and was killed. The other was captured with all the booty.
