Circuit Court Proceedings.

Thursday, March 29, 1895 - Court met - Judge Crane on the bench. Equity case, No. 705, James E. Tippett, assignee, vs. Demetrius Coode and wife was argued before the Court by James E. Tippett, of the Baltimore bar for assignee, and Robt. C. Combs for judgment creditor.

No. 17 criminal appearances, State vs. Clem. Lloyd was the next case called.

Indicted for carelessly shooting on public road. Plea of not guilty and tried before the Court. Judgment of guilty and a fine of \$1 and costs imposed.

The Pettit Jury was temporarily discharged.

The Court at 4 p. m., after discharging all attendants except Crier and one bailiff adjourned until Friday at 10, a. m.

Friday, March 30, 1895. Court met, present as yesterday.

Petition for writ of Habeas Corpus, George A. Creighton vs. State was next called. Evidence taken and judgment of lower Court affirmed as to guilt of the prisoner but sentence modified to confinement in House of Correction for period of 4 months.

The Court, at 3 p. m., adjourned until Monday.

Monday, April 1, 1895. Court met, pursuant to Friday's adjournment Judge Crane on the bench. The case of State vs. Alfred Chapman was tried before the Court as follows: Indicted for assault with intent to kill Wm. O. Dorsey on or about Oct. 21, 1891. Plea of not guilty. Limitations pleaded as to second count of the indictment and that count quashed. Tried on first count. Judgment of not guilty. Court adjourned till further notice.
