

be defeated and the successor of Mr. Gibson in the United States Senate be a Republican, then what has been won for tariff reform and an honest dollar will count as nothing.

"If the people of such a great commercial and industrial city as Baltimore are to declare to North Carolina, which is so closely allied by business intercourse with it, that their experience under Democratic government is such that they hope for better things under Republican rule, then we, ourselves, with this example of distrust of our party, will have but little heart to venture forth for the restoration of our State to the supremacy of a white man's government. We appeal to Maryland for a better example and for a bolder assertion of Democracy than is foreshadowed by the purpose of independence, linked with the infamy of radicalism in that State."

It seems to me that these are words that ought to be heeded by every patriotic Marylander.

Mr. Dana's code of principles, which have been extensively circulated and much commented upon, are good enough to reprint:

- I. Get the news, get all the news, and nothing but the news.
- II. Copy nothing from another publication without perfect credit.
- III. Never print an interview without the knowledge and consent of the party interviewed.
- IV. Never print a paid advertisement as news matter. Let every advertisement appear as an advertisement; no sailing under false colors.
- V. Never attack the weak or the defenseless, either by argument, by invective, or by ridicule unless there is some absolute public necessity for so doing.
- VI. Fight for your principles, but do not believe that they contain the whole truth or the only truth.
- VII. Support your party if you have one. But do not think all the good men are in it and all the bad ones on the outside of it.
- VIII. Above all, know and believe that humanity is advancing; that there is progress in human life and human affairs; and that, as sure as God lives, the future will be better than the present or the past.

Lecture, delivered at Cornell University in January, 1894, closes with these six maxims of value:

- I. Never be in a hurry.
- II. Hold fast to the Constitution.
- III. Stand by the Stars and Stripes. Above all, stand for Liberty, whatever happens.
- IV. A word that is not spoken never does any mischief.
- V. All the goodness of a good egg cannot make up for the badness of a bad one.
- VI. If you find you have been wrong, don't fear to say so.

Three persons to be Judges of the Orphans' Court for St. Mary's County.
One person to be State's Attorney for St. Mary's County.
One person to be Sheriff for St. Mary's County.
One person to be County Commissioner for St. Mary's County.
One person to be Surveyor for St. Mary's County.

The Polls will be opened at 9 o'clock, A. M., and close at 6 o'clock, P. M.

NOTICE

To Hotel Keepers and all others who deal in Liquors.

For the information of all persons concerned the following Sections of Article 32 of the Code of Public General Laws, of the State of Maryland, are published:

AN ACT prohibiting the sale of spirituous or fermented liquors in the several counties of the State on the day of Election.

SECTION 32. It shall not be lawful for the keeper of any hotel, tavern, store, drinking establishment, or any other place where liquors are sold, or for any person or persons, directly or indirectly, to sell, barter, give or dispose of any spirituous or fermented liquors, ale or beer, or intoxicating drinks of any kind, on the day of any election hereafter to be held in the several counties of the State.

SEC. 33. Any person violating the provisions of the preceding section shall be liable to indictment by the Grand Jury of the county where the offense is committed and shall, upon conviction, before any Judge of the Circuit Court of this State, be fined a sum of not less than fifty nor more than one hundred dollars for each and every offense—one half the fine shall be paid to the informer, the other half to the County Commissioners for the use of public roads.

SEC. 34. No person shall make any bet or wager on the result of any election to take place in this State.

SEC. 35. Any person offending against the last preceding section, shall be liable to indictment in the Circuit Courts, if the offense be committed in the county, or in the Criminal Court of Baltimore, if the offense be committed in that city, and on conviction shall be fined not less than fifty nor more than five hundred dollars, to be paid to the State for the use of the school fund.

SEC. 37. Every deposit of money in any part of the State as a wager or bet upon the result of an election shall be forfeited and paid over to the County Commissioners of the county where deposited, for the use of the county; and if deposited in the city of Baltimore, to the Mayor and City Council.
