Charles County Relief. The bill for the relief of Charles county has passed the Senate and will now go to the Governor for approval.

Consecration. (Reported for the Beacon.) The Consecration of the Rev. Henry Y. Satterlee, D. D., as first Bishop of the Diocese of Washington, took place in Calvary Protestant Episcopal Church, New York City, on Wednesday morning, March 25th.

The Rev. Arthur C. Cox acted for the presiding bishop, assisted by Bishops Paret, Potter and 10 other bishops. The sermon was preached by Bishop Huntington, of Central New York, on the subject of "The Everlasting Kingdom of Christ."

Dr. Satterlee has been rector of Calvary Church since 1882, during which time he has maintained a strong and influential work among both poor and rich.

He was elected Bishop of Washington at the Primary Convention of the new diocese in December, receiving the necessary two thirds vote in a short while after the presentation of his name.

His first Episcopal act was the confirmation of a large class of candidates in Calvary Church on the evening of the day of his consecration. He confirmed in Washington last Sunday (March 29th).

Canfield Jenkins, Hamilton and J. Camillus Edward, all of Charles county, will be on hand to explain the principles of the party.

Recently, in passing Mr. W. K. Herbert's store, at Hill Top, about 1 a. m., on his return from a sick call, Dr. W. B. Dent thought he smelled smoke. The Doctor investigated and rousing Mr. Herbert, the two gentlemen entered the store. They were soon to see that a fire was under way and a roll of cotton and a box of boots had been burned. The blaze was extinguished without further damage.

Rock Point in Ashes.

About 1 a. m., Tuesday, March 31st, ultimo, the storehouse at Rock Point, Charles county, caught fire and together with its contents was burned. Capt. James H. Cheseldine, who was staying with Mr. Wade H. Blakistone, discovered the fire and gave the alarm. A friend who was asleep in one of the rooms made a narrow escape and was only saved by Mr. Blakistone knocking out the panels of the door and pulling the semi-conscious man through the hole. All of the inmates lost most of their clothing. The building was owned by Mr. Spearman Lancaster and was occupied by Mr. Robert D. Blakistone. Mr. Blakistone lost his entire stock of goods estimated at about \$8000 and but partially insured. The storehouse was insured for a small amount.
