Democratic primaries are called for next Saturday and we hope Democrats will take an interest in them and attend. Send representative Democrats to the County Convention—men who when they get there will act for the good of the party and who will perform their duties as delegates in a way to insure satisfaction to all reasonable men. There is no reason why there should be any display of other than kindest feelings at next Tuesday's Convention.

The law specifies how the assessment shall be made, and the plain duty of the assessors, it seems to us, is to obey the law. Property should be assessed at its "full cash value." No fictitious value should be put upon it or under the law, as we understand it, can be placed upon it. It will be unfortunate, maybe, if our tax-rate, after the new assessment, goes very high, but the high rate will have the effect of stirring up the people to demand rigid economy. It is not for assessors to say how the assessment shall be made—whether it is to be high or low—but to assess as the law provides. If this be done the duty of the assessors will have been faithfully performed.

## The Coming Assessment.

Years of experience as Clerk to the Commissioners' Court, great ability as a lawyer, and good judgment as a business man, peculiarly fit J. F. Morgan, Esq., of this town, to express an opinion on the "Coming Assessment," and, at our request, he has embodied his views on that subject in the following letter to the BEACON:

LEONARDTOWN, MD.,  
May 27, 1896.

Messrs. Editors:—At your request I have looked over the new assessment law with a view of giving you my opinion as to its execution by the officers appointed for that purpose, and as to its probable effect upon the taxpayers of the county. I have not been able to give the law a very careful consideration, but a casual reading of it discloses to me some points which I will state in this letter.

I have long been an advocate for reassessment. Our last assessment was 1876—twenty years ago. Since that time real estate has not increased in value—it has rather decreased—but this is not material, provided certain characters of land were uniformly assessed under the last assessment. The main object of an assessment is to carry out the Constitutional provision, that every one should constitute to support of government in proportion to his or her actual worth in real and personal property. While all the real estate has remained on the tax books since the last assessment, a large amount of personal property has been stricken therefrom. The tendency, after every new assessment, is to strike off personal property, and in time, without a new assessment, it would all go and land alone would bear the burdens of taxation. I therefore think that it should be the main object of the assessors to get all the personal property on the assessment. It is estimated that a quarter of a million, in personal property, has been taken from the books since the last assessment. With everybody taxed

the burdens of taxation would be justly and equitably distributed.

The rule of valuation, under the law, shall be the "full cash value not looking to a forced sale," except in cases where persons fail to report their property, the assessors shall then value said property to the "utmost cash value." It makes very little difference, except possibly in regard to the State tax, whether property, real or personal, is valued high or low, provided property of the same character or species is valued uniformly. It would be better, possibly, that the property were valued high as the tax rate would be decreased without an increase of individual tax bills. It is to be regretted that the assessors at large were not appointed for the whole county, as the assessors in the two general assessment districts of the county may not have the same idea of assessing values. Without they do have the same idea a hard and lasting inequality is established until a new assessment gives a remedy. If possible, the four assessors at large should confer and have some unassessing certain kinds of property. It is true that the County Commissioners are constituted a Board of Control and Review, but they cannot intelligently correct the assessment of real estate without seeing it.

Under the law, all persons liable to taxation are furnished blank forms in which to fill out a list of their property. The law allows them twenty days in which to do this. They are then sent to the assessors. If the assessors propose to make any change in the assessment so made they give the taxpayer ten days notice of same. If the assessors increase the said assessment and the taxpayer feels aggrieved he has a last appeal to the County Commissioners, who are constituted, under the law, as a Board of Control and Review, and meet on 2nd Tuesday of September, unless the time for making the assessment has been extended by the Governor, and then when the assessment is completed. I fear that this system of listing the property by the taxpayers will not be effectual, as it would be remarkable did it not destroy that uniformity so necessary in a proper adjustment of taxation. The assessors organize and begin work on the 1st Monday of June. The law makes heavy penalties for anyone trying to evade the provisions of the law in any particular.

So, Messrs. Editors, the main object of the law, in my opinion, is that the Constitutional provision be carried out and that all property liable to assessment be put upon the books, and that the property so assessed be assessed at its full cash value, which will be equitable and just, provided property of a similar character is uniformly assessed.

Librarian Gadd is expected to resign this week.

Army worm ravages are reported from Dorchester county.

Fire at Westminster destroyed the undertaking establishment of Earhart & Stoner.

Governor Lowndes has appointed assessors for all the counties except Anne Arundel.

Mr. George McLeod, a well known fruit grower, died at Beltsville, aged eighty-one years.

The court at Snow Hill, Worcester county, will have two murder trials this week.

George R. Stephens, aged seventy-three years, was found dead in his bed at Annapolis Junction.

Stephen F. Blay, colored, was accidentally killed under the wheels of a wagon in Caroline county.

A freight wreck occurred at Okonoke, Allegany county, on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad.

It is proposed to issue \$10,000 in bonds to provide waterworks for Denton, Caroline county.

Judge Charles B. Roberts, of the Court of Appeals, has been elected president of a bank in Westminster.

Virginia State Fishery Force rife men are defending the waters below the Maryland line from outside crabs.

Diplomas were awarded to four ladies, graduates of the training school for nurses at the hospital in Cumberland.

New mines are being developed in the Roaring Creek tract recently purchased by Philadelphia capitalists.

The late John Douglas, who died at Leonardtown was one of the thirty-eight original Lincoln republicans of Allegany county.

Thomas Donnelly has been locked up in Elkton jail charged with attempting to burn Edward Rowland's barn and with writing threatening letters.

Rain interfered to some extent with the ceremonies attending to a flag and Bible presentation to the public school of Middle-town, Frederick county, by the Order of Mechanics.

The Grand Jury of Harford county have been unable to solve the mystery surrounding the death of Miss Annie Sanders, whose corpse was found some time ago in the woods near Clermont Mills.

A hand car with a construction crew on it was knocked from the track of the Cumberland Valley Division Western Maryland early Monday morning and two or three of the men were injured.

There are 38 graduates this year at the Western Maryland College, Westminster, Attorney-General Clabaugh has issued a circular letter to election supervisors in regard to creating new voting precincts in the counties.

W. Lemuel Buxton, his wife and two young daughters were assaulted with an axe and a nearly killed while in their beds at their home, in Gathersburg, Montgomery county, early Monday morning. Two negroes were arrested and transferred from Rockville to the jail in Baltimore city.
