Frank N. Holmes Dead.

Though not unexpected, the announcement, Wednesday night, of the death of Mr. Frank N. Holmes was a shock to our community. Mr. Holmes died at the City Hospital, Baltimore, June 17, 1896, aged about 42 years.

The deceased was a man of note in our county. His boyhood was one of earnest effort and before he reached his majority the death of his father devolved upon him a man's responsibilities and cares, and in a manly spirit he accepted them and so performed them.

Teacher in the public schools, member of the House of Delegates, Clerk to the Commissioners' Court, School Examiner, Editor of the Enterprise, lawyer and merchant, epitomized the story of his life. In whatever he undertook he threw into the task all of his great energy and vim, and the results of his efforts are before the public.

In enterprises for the improvement of the county he was ever an active worker. He was a dutiful son, kind husband, indulgent father and sincere friend. The span of his life was brief, but it was energetically and actively spent, and we live in deeds, not years; in thoughts, not breaths; in feelings, not in figures on a dial.

We should count time by heart-throbs. He most lives. Who thinks most, feels the noblest, acts the best.

Graduated With Honors.

The twenty eighth annual commencement of Mount St. Agnes Collegiate Institute was held on the 18th, instant. Among the graduates, who achieved special distinction was Miss Corinne Genevieve Gough, of this county, who received the following honors: Diploma of graduation, crown and gold medal; gold medal in the Senior Classes of Christian Doctrine; gold medal, presented by Monsignor McColgan for excellence in conduct; gold medal in Senior Class of piano for excellence in music, and gold medal in the culinary department. The medals were conferred by Rev. John A. Morgan, Loyola College. Miss Gough has been a student at Mt. St. Agnes ten years and is a daughter of Mr. J. Pike Gough.

Farmers' Club.

The Britton's Neck Farmers' Club met at J. J. and J. S. Alvey's, five members being present. Proceedings of last meeting were read and approved. The examining committee, J. T. Abell, J. T. Johnson and G. F. Tennesson, reported as follows:

We have examined the farm and surroundings of Mr. J. J. Alvey and find a good stand of crop tobacco; corn badly crippled by cut and bud worms; his barn needs some repairs; old crop of tobacco common; onions a drought of last year; horses and cattle in good shape; hogs very fine; a good cut of timothy and clover for hay; wheat an average crop; poultry very numerous and of all kinds; the dwelling and surrounding buildings neatly painted and whitewashed, owing to the ladies of the house.

Ordered, that the treasurer pay J. T. Abell fifteen dollars to pay for repairs for threshing and engine.

Ordered, that the Secretary correspond with J. S. Robinson and request him to lecture for the club and farmers of the county.

After a hearty vote of thanks to host and hostess and special thanks to Miss Page Alvey for the very nice manner in which she waited on the club at the table with ice cream, water iced and cake of most excellent make, the club adjourned to meet at Leonardtown the third Saturday in July.

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Appointment of Registrars.

Pursuant to requirements of the new Election Law, the Supervisors of Elections for St. Mary's county met in the Court House Monday last. G. Oscar Withen presided over the meeting and Thomas H. Bond was Secretary.

Mr. Bond first proposed the Democratic officials and the following selections were made: St. Inigo's—W. Wallace Dubler. Valley Lee—T. Edward Loker. Leonardtown—Mr. Bond named Edw'd. B. Harrison. Mr. Bond submitted the names of H. Stanislaus Jarboe, W. V. Waters and G. M. Raley. Mr. Raley was selected.

Chaptico—Mr. Bond proposed G. W. Maddox. Mr. Reintzell vetoed the appointment. From the three names submitted by Mr. Bond—Messrs. Thomas C. Edwards, James L. Mattingly Noble L. Penn—Mr. Edwards was selected.

Mechanicville—Appointment deferred until Tuesday.

Patuxent—J. Thomas Parsons. Milestown—Mr. Bond proposed the name of Mr. James T. Blair. Vetoed by Mr. Reintzell. The names of Lewis K. Mattingly, J. M. Dent, Jr., and R. M. Swann submitted. Mr. Mattingly was selected.

Bay—Jeff. B. Jarboe. Island—Charles F. Poe.

Mr. Withen next read off the Republican slate and the following selections were made: St. Inigo's—Lewis E. Tonnison. Valley Lee—Alpheus Harris. Leonardtown—Francis F. Graves. Chaptico—Edward Russell.

Mechanicville—Thomas E. Bowling. Patuxent—Thomas Jones.

Milestown—T. George Hodges was proposed and vetoed. The names of John H. Harding, Stephen O. Tonnison and Fred Gass were submitted and Fred Gass selected by Mr. Bond.

Bay—F. Biscoe Jones. Island—Richard T. Ball.

Before the board left the Court room a proposition was made to Mr. Bond and agreed to by him to reconsider the selections in Milestown district. Messrs. Blair and Hodges were then chosen. On Tuesday, Mr. Josiah H. Hancock was chosen as the Democratic representative in the 5th district.
